PIONEER FIDDLER DIES OF OLD AGE

"Hop" Pender, Known by All Early Comes to Utah, Succumbs to General Debility.

Hopkins C. Pender, age 86 years, the pioneer "fiddler" of Utah, who in his younger days delighted to help furnish music in the old Social hall while the pioneers "tripped the light fantastic," died of old age Saturday afternoon at 132 1/2 west South Temple, where he had lived ten years.

"Hop" Pender, as he was affectionately called, was born at Knoxville, Tenn., Oct. 3, 1824. He joined the Mormon church in Illinois in 1839, and his property was burned by the mobs at Carthage. He moved to Iowa, where he met and married Miss Jeanetta Drake. With his wife he moved to Utah in 1850, and he resided here since that time, living for many years in the Thirteenth ward. He spent most of his time at social and in various church capacities, and for years at the Sunday afternoon tabernacle services he never failed to occupy a seat on the front bench to the left of the aisle, directly in front of the stand.

Pioneer Pender was an extremely sensitive man. Four years ago he hung up his ancient fiddle and has never touched it since. When asked to play, he would say laughingly, "I broke my finger, and can't play any more."

In the olden days, he was closely associated with Billy Foster, Billy Ritter, S. Olson, Dan Olson and Billy Gables. When asked, a week before his death if a certain old pioneer was a friend of his he quickly replied: "All the good Saints were my friends."

For the past five years, the pioneer fiddler made his home with Mr. and Mrs. Edward Cherrill, at 132 1/2 west South Temple, where he was very kind to him, fully appreciating the sterling worth of the old man.

FRUIT RATES. It is further ordered that such of the defendants as participate in the traffic, according as their various lines or routes may run, be, and they are hereby notified and required to establish, on or before the first day of October, 1910, and maintain in force thereafter during a period of not less than two years, rates for the transportation of citrus fruits and deciduous fruits in cartloads from producing points in California to Salt Lake City, Provo and Ogden, Utah, which shall not exceed \$1 per 100 pounds, with minimum cartload weight not exceeding that contemporaneously applied from the same points of origin to eastern destinations.
