

HARRY THORNE NOW ON TRIAL

Faces Jury of Twelve Men Which Holds His Life in Its Hands.

WHAT STATE WILL PROVE.

District Attorney Loofbourrow in Opening Statement Tells Story of Fassell's Murder.

At times smiling, at times taking notes on his own account and advising his attorney concerning certain points in the testimony, Harry Thorne, charged with the murder of George W. Fassell at the latter's grocery store at 619 east Fourth South on the evening of March 28 of this year, sat in court this morning showing the unconcern of the hardened criminal of the boy's unappreciative of the seriousness of his grave position.

In making the opening statement to the jury Fred C. Loofbourrow, district attorney, briefly detailed the events of the night when three masked men entered the store and ordered Fassell and Jacobsen to hold up their hands, and furthermore how the youngest of them shot Fassell in the heart when he refused to hand over the money.

Mr. Loofbourrow said that Thorne made two confessions of the crime, both of his own free will and accord. On the morning of March 27, after the murder of the night before, Thorne requested to see the chief of police, and before him he made a complete confession of the crime as follows: Salt Lake City, Utah, March 27, 1910. Confession of Harry Thorne of the murder of G. W. Fassell on the night of March 28, 1910.

Hayes and myself and a man named Curly, whom I had not met before, left the room about 7:30 p.m. intending to hold up the first place that looked good. We went into the store, which you may be Fassell's. Hayes stood about half way along the counter, facing the butcher. We told them to hold up their hands. The butcher held his up high, but Fassell did not hold his up high enough, or fast enough, and as I was trying to get them together near the north end of the counter, the butcher ran through the back, and I put the gun against Fassell's side to hurry him up, and it went off. After shooting Fassell, I took some money out of the cash register. Curly had taken some money before I got to it.

The pencil sketch of the store signed by me is also correct. (Signed) HARRY THORNE, Witness.

When Thorne was taken to the state prison he was confronted by Gov. Spry, Sheriff Sharp and the warden of the prison, and, according to the statement of Mr. Loofbourrow, before the jury, made a full and complete confession of the crime, going even more into detail than he had in the previous admission of guilt. The governor had warned Thorne that whatever he said would be used against him; but he gave the confession.

The first witness called for the state this morning was John W. Mackey of the county surveyor's office, who merely testified concerning the accuracy of the maps he had made of the streets of the city. W. A. Sheets, the court reporter, testified that the bloody overalls, shoes, revolver, etc., introduced in court were the same that were given in evidence in the Riley case.
