THE NEW RUG COAT FOR TOURIST AND MOTOR WEAR.

The rug coat is built on loose, comfortable lines, with wide armholes and big patch pockets; and it slips on and off very easily as a coat intended for steamer or motoring use should do. Always be fresh and immaculate, or the effect is utterly spoiled. "For a dessert try Emergency Puffs: Drain canned peaches from their syrup and cut fruit in quarters," says Fannie Merritt Farmer in Woman's Home Companion. "Mix and sift one cup of bread-crumbs, one-half teaspoonful of salt and two tablespoonfuls of baking-powder (level measurements). Moisten to a soft dough and drop a spoonful of the mixture in each place a piece of peach in each and cover peach with another spoonful of dough. Steam ten minutes and serve at once. Notice what a large quantity of the powder is used in this recipe, two tablespoonfuls, not two teaspoonfuls.

"Remove puffs from molds and serve with peach sauce: To drained syrup add one third of a cupful of sugar and a few grains of salt. Bring to the boiling-point and let simmer until the syrup is thick. In strawberry season sweetened crushed strawberries are delicious to serve with these little puffs. In raspberry season, sweetened crushed raspberries may be substituted with delightful results."

"For those who enjoy using the chafing-dish let me suggest Manhattan Shrimps," says Merritt Farmer in Woman's Home Companion. "Melt one tablespoonful of butter, add one tablespoonful of flour and stir until well blended; then pour on gradually, while stirring constantly, one-half cupful of thin cream and one-third of a cupful of stewed and strained tomatoes mixed with a few grains of soda. Bring to the boiling-point and add one cupful of finely-cut shrimps, one egg slightly beaten, and one and one-half cupfuls of canned shrimps broken in pieces. Season to taste with salt, mustard and cayenne, and serve just as soon as the pieces of cheese have entirely melted.
