

PESSIMISTIC VIEW OF REVOLUTION

Portuguese Minister to France Thinks It Will Have Far-reaching Effect.

CONSIDERS IT A MISFORTUNE

Because of juxtaposition to Spain Will Give Rise to the Gravest Problems.

Paris, Oct. 7.—The course of affairs in Portugal is destined to have a most important and far-reaching effect upon all Europe, in the opinion of Count Souza-Couto, the Portuguese minister in Paris.

Count Souza-Couto takes a pessimistic view of the revolutionary movement. He declares that he no longer considers himself the minister of Portugal, regarding the proclamation of a republic as a formal severance of his obligations.

"I will not serve this Republican government," he says. "Not because my opinions are retrograded—I lived too long in the United States for that—but because I do not believe that Portugal is ripe for the application of such liberal ideas. The population is ignorant and exposed to all kinds of political temptations."

"A republican government in Portugal would be composed of men unsettled in views, unprepared for the power entrusted to them, divided over questions of doctrine as well as by personal rivalry and ambitions."

"Frankly, I consider the revolution a great misfortune. The establishment of a republic will give birth to the gravest problems, chiefly because of the juxtaposition of monarchical Spain. The result must be either Spain will become a republic too, or that she will be forced in self-protection to intervene."

"The triumph of republicanism in Spain would probably result in the es-

Establishment of an Iberian republic, which would introduce a new and grave factor in the European concert question.

"The question of the Portuguese colonies is still more important. Every one knows that these have already formed the subject of diplomatic exchanges of views between Germany and England and in this connection the words 'secret understandings' have even been pronounced. Recent events bring this matter to a head. Unquestionably the new rivalry aroused by the opening of such a question and by the result of the transactions which would follow, would be unfavorable to the maintenance of peace in Europe."

"Incidentally, it is not hard to guess at whose expense any such transactions over the Portuguese colonies would be carried out."

NEW REPUBLIC PROCLAIMED IN SEVERAL PROVINCES

Paris, Oct. 7.—Dispatches to the Paris newspapers tell of the proclaiming of the new Portuguese republic in several states of the provinces. It is evident however, that the Republicans have not been completely victorious and that the resistance of the monarchists is not yet overcome at most points, for telegraphic service is interrupted.

The customs officials at the points of collection along the frontier continue at

their posts and are collecting the usual duties, but without knowing for which regime they are acting. The officials and the soldiers at these frontier posts maintain for the most part a discreet neutral attitude, awaiting the notification of the new government to the provincial authorities.

GUNNER THOS. ALLEN TO BE EXECUTED DEC. 4

Victoria, B. C., Oct. 7.—Gunner Thos. Allen of the Royal Canadian artillery, who killed Capt. Peter Emmott, his commanding officer, Aug. 1, was sentenced yesterday to hang Dec. 4.

The crime was committed at Work Point barracks. Allen shot the officer down from a window of the barracks room when he was having the company's office, 50 yards away. Allen harbored a grievance against Capt. Emmott owing to a sentence of imprisonment previously imposed upon him for violation of the army regulations.

WOMAN CAPTURES TWO MEN FOUND IN HOME

Stockton, Cal., Oct. 7.—Finding two men in her home when she returned from a drive yesterday, Mrs. George Chapman secured a pistol from her kitchen and when one of the intruders ran into the street she chased and forced him to halt. The other, who had followed apparently to witness the pursuit was also called upon to surrender, and both were held until the police arrived. Their names are Charles Waddell, alias "Nick" and Ernest Bowen.

\$6,000 "GIFT" MADE TO TWO LEGISLATORS

New York, Oct. 6.—H. F. Zimmerman, legislative agent of the Lyons Sugar Refining company, testified before the legislative graft committee today that he had made a hand-to-hand gift of \$6,000 to former Senators John H. Raines and George W. Burnett, both now dead. He testified that the gift was made "in recognition of good work in securing the passage of legislation beneficial to the Lyons sugar refinery company."

Zimmerman said he also passed \$300 to Charles H. Betts, then chief clerk of the revision department of the assembly, "for his good work in getting the money handed to Burnett, the witness said, was to be used as the latter 'saw fit' in recompensing other persons."

In 1909, the witness said, Mr. Raines had suggested drawing up a new beet sugar bounty act. The new act made the bounty payable to the farmer "for his assign" instead of to the manufacturer. Mr. Zimmerman added he had told Senator Raines and Assemblyman Burnett that if the bill passed, "the company would give \$1,500 for distribution." Both had promised to do all in their power to further the passage of the bill.

When the bill had become law, the witness said he gave \$12,000 in money to Senator Raines and a few days later gave Assemblyman Burnett \$3,000 in two packages, telling him \$1,500 was for his own use and \$1,500 for distribution. "As he saw fit," he would not say to whom the license company, from whom he declared he had secured the money, wished the latter \$1,500 to go.

Mr. Zimmerman said his company made most of the law making the "sugar bounty" payable to the farmer or his assigns, "persuading the farmers to assign their bounties to the company."

Many of the children, it is said, receive very little of any food before going to school, and one of the truancy officers declared he knew of instances where all the children received for breakfast was a dil pickle.
