

**SCHOOL ELECTION
COMES NEXT MONTH**

December 7 to be the Date for Selection of Six Board Members.

The Salt Lake City school election is to be held Wednesday, Dec. 7, and on that date six new members of the school board will be chosen.

The board consists of 10 members, and ordinarily only half of these are elected at one time, but on account of the death of one of the members, six will be chosen this year. The Fifth ward will elect two members instead of one.

Ledyard M. Bailey and W. J. Barrette are the retiring members of the Fifth ward. Mr. Bailey succeeded the late Joseph Oberdorfer and Mr. Barrette succeeded the late Judge Henderson. Following the custom, Judge Henderson was allowed to name Mr. Bailey to succeed Mr. Oberdorfer, and it fell to Mr. Bailey's lot a little later to name Mr. Barrette to succeed the man who had named him. The members so chosen are selected to serve only two years, short term, hence the necessity for the election of two members in the Fifth ward now.

A successor to H. P. Van Pelt is to be named in the First municipal ward; in the Second ward to Samuel C. Park, who succeeded the late M. J. Cheesman; in the Third to William J. Newman, who has represented his ward in the fourth year of his term; in the Fourth to James T. Hammond, now board president. The holdover members are: Charles S. Martin, First ward; Arnold G. Glaucque, Second ward; Oscar W. Toyle, Third ward; Mathoniah Thomas, Fourth ward.

L. P. Judd, clerk of the board, has been instructed to proceed with the arrangements necessary for the election. The members of the board will select the polling places and choose the judges in their respective wards. The number of polling places has not yet been decided on. Paper ballots will be used in this election.

WIDOW WILLING TO SHARE.

Mrs. Walker Says She Has No Desire To Claim Entire Estate.

Mrs. Althea Walker, widow of the late D. F. Walker, who was served with papers last Friday in Seattle at the end of a 1,200-mile flight in an automobile, citing her to appear in Salt Lake before Judge John A. Marshall and show cause why she should not be punished for contempt, for she had refused to submit to the examination of the estate, which she had refused to accept. Mrs. Walker declares the entire estate is not worth \$1,000,000 and the contesting heirs declare that it is valued at \$200,000.

"We are not contesting the will," declared C. C. Dey, counsel for Mrs. Sarah Paul and the contestants, when informed of Mrs. Walker's willingness to submit. "Under the laws of California the will is entirely satisfactory to the children by the first wife. Though Walker left his entire estate to Mrs. Althea Walker, there was no express clause by which the children of the first wife were disinherited, and under the California law this means that they share equally with the widow.

"The point of contest is the estate itself. The defendants have possession of a large amount of securities, and have indicated their determination to hold on to them. Their plan is to undervalue the estate, thereby escaping an equal division of the part of it already in their possession."

Mrs. Walker, Clarence Walker and Margaret Walker Smoot, together with B. G. Raybould, who are alleged to have left Salt Lake with a large amount of securities belonging to the estate, are expected to return some time this week to answer the citation for contempt in the federal court. Raybould, who acted as an agent of the widow, was served with the citation papers in San Mateo county, Cal., several hours after the runaway heirs had been located in Seattle.

PREST. JOHN HENRY SMITH.

President John Henry Smith said that if he were judge he would say that Elder Schulthess had won his case. There is no real truth in the minds of all saints, or any reasonable man, of the existence of a supreme Being or of the life and ministry of Jesus Christ, while men with minds so arranged as not to believe in God, are endowed with all the attributes of the normal mental makeup. Everything about us testifies to the necessity for a governing power. Men who claim to believe in the goodness of our Father and of government, are controlled by their appetites and passions. The speaker dwelt upon the commands given to the kind of men who do not believe in God. Of course there are exceptions to this rule, but it is pretty well established that it is the rule. The speaker said that he had seen a man who had been visited to him by an atheist, who, accompanied by his little boy, boasted of his unbelief, declaring before his child that there was no God, and that he had no doubt in his mind that his father had that there was no God, and that there was no sin in taking life in case one became angered at his fellow men. I turned to this boy and asked him not to repeat those utterances. I told him there was a God, and at that moment his father knew there was a God, and was suffering all the while a reckoning when God will be our judge, and we shall pay to the last farthing for the deeds done in the flesh.

The gospel of the Redeemer is from God; the views of atheistic men are fallacious. Every being must meet his God and the Justice of his Judgment. The commands given are just as true now as they were in the beginning, and may not violate them with impunity; every son and daughter of God must meet his or her record and must pay the bills. The speaker bore testimony to the truth of the gospel, and closed with a blessing upon all.

The choir sang the anthem, "Song of the Redeemed," and the benediction was pronounced by President Richard W. Young.

WEATHER FORECAST.

For Salt Lake City and vicinity: Generally fair and colder tonight and Tuesday.

For Utah: Cloudy with rain or snow and colder tonight; Tuesday, clearing and colder.

WEATHER SUMMARY.

The atmospheric pressure is low east of the Mississippi river with the center of depression over Nova Scotia. Temperatures are about normal in the region except along the Gulf coast, where they are higher than usual at this season. Except in the southwest, the pressure west of the Mississippi

river is above normal, the crest of the high pressure wave being over the Dakotas. Temperatures are about normal in this section except in the southern portion, where they are unusually high. Rain or snow has fallen along the lakes, in the upper Mississippi and Missouri valleys, and in Colorado. The indications point to generally fair weather in this vicinity with colder tonight and Tuesday.

COMPARATIVE DATA FOR SALT LAKE CITY.

The highest temperature yesterday was 55 degrees; the mean was 50, or 3 degrees above normal. The lowest temperature this morning was 44 de-

grees. The temperature record for the month shows an accumulated excess of 102 degrees, and for the year of 75 degrees. The relative humidity yesterday at 6 p. m. was 65 per cent, and this morning at the same time was 76 per cent. The total precipitation for the month to date was 0.02 inch, which is 0.59 inch below normal. The total for the year so far was 9.12 inches, which is 4.76 inches below normal. The sun rises at 7:15 a. m., and sets at 5:11 p. m. The moon sets at 4:08 a. m., rises at 3:59 p. m., and sets again at 6:27 a. m. of the 15th.
