SHOULD PROBE COAL COMBINE

SWALLOWED DEADLY DRUG

TO BE BUILT NEAR UINTAH

THE TIME WILL BE EXTENDED

MADE A MORTGAGE LOAN

Law Provides for Dissolution of Companies in Combination for Restraint of Trade.

On Advice of Friends She Tries to Relieve Her Pain, and Death Is the Result.

H. A. Strauss, Consulting Engineer, Tells of Plans for Hydro-Electric Project.

Railroads Say to Comply With Demand Of Commission Would Involve Much Labor and Expense.

Allege That They Were Deprived of the Use of Money and Ask Court for Relief.

Governor William Spry and Secretary of State Charles S. Tingey are heartily in accord with the action of the city council Monday night in instructing the city attorney to take up the cudgel in the coal combine fight. The governor said that it was a good move and should result beneficially while the secretary of state said that he was ready at any time to perform his sworn duty in taking action toward breaking up the alleged combine whenever evidence of any such combine was presented to him.

After swallowing a corrosive sublimate of mercury tablet over two weeks ago Mrs. Mary S. Pullman of Heyburn, Idaho, finally died in terrible agony today at the Dr. Groves L. D. S. hospital.

Work on the construction of one of the most important enterprises of its kind in the entire country, and which will involve an expenditure exceeding half a million dollars for the development of power, was begun yesterday, when the construction of the hydro-electric forebay for a modern power plant to be built by the Davis & Weber Counties Canal company near Uintah.

Washington, Nov. 21.—Many of the railroads in the eastern trunk line territory today asked the interstate commerce commission for relief from answering some of the detailed inquiries recently called for by the commission with a view to aiding that body in connection with the investigation of proposed increases of freight rates.

Alleging that the Home Trust & Savings company secured the payment of \$1,099 on two notes by fraud and deception, Laura S. and M. M. Johnson have commenced suit in the Third district court against the trust company to recover \$241.10, said to be a reasonable interest on the money, the use of which they were deprived of for several years.

"A mistaken impression seems to prevail in some quarters that the secretary of state has full authority to revoke the charter of companies entering into combines in restraint of trade, or combines that are trusts in the sense of the word. The law is plain in the matter and it is up to the courts to finally determine the matter. If the injured parties, which in this case is the public, have reason to believe that there is a trust or combine in effect and force in restraint of trade, they may file their complaint with me together with the evidence, and then it becomes my duty to notify the offending companies that unless they withdraw from the combine within 30 days their charters will be revoked. The facts will be presented to the attorney-general in turn, and he shall apply to the court for a revocation of charters; it is up to the courts to do that."

The new plant will be located just this side of the mouth of the Weber canyon, near Uintah station. It will be a hydro-electric plant with an ultimate capacity of about 15,000-horsepower, generated by the waters of the Davis & Weber Counties canal which takes off from the mouth of the Weber canyon and is carried 10 miles through Davis and Weber counties. The canal has just been completed and is one of the most important enterprises of the kind in the United States.

The commission directed the other 23 railroads to answer by Dec. 1 so far as possible the first four questions which relate to mileage, revenues, equipment, and transportation matters, and general expenses, different classes of equipment, etc.

The plaintiffs further allege that on Nov. 15, 1906, they paid to the defendant \$1,099 as a part payment on the two notes, but that no credit for the money was given, and that the defendant had the use of the money from Nov. 13, 1906, to Oct. 24, 1910, upon which date the notes were paid and the mortgage released.

INDIANS TESTIFY.

Sections 1759 and 1760, title 65, of the laws of 1907, give the state officials power to act. They read as follows: "Section 1759—It shall be the duty of the secretary of state, upon satisfactory evidence that any corporation, partnership, or association of persons, incorporated or operating under the laws of this state, has entered into any trust, combination, or agreement, or has done any act, or has done any thing, which is prohibited by the provisions of this title, to cause an investigation to be made, and to report the results thereof to the attorney-general in turn, and he shall apply to the court for a revocation of charters; it is up to the courts to do that."

The physician says also that he has known of cases of death by this poison in the past year under circumstances similar to that of Mrs. Pullman.

The design was undertaken by Engineer Strauss several months ago, and is now so far along that actual construction of the hydroelectric forebay began yesterday. The plant will be placed in operation, according to Engineer Strauss' calculation, about a year hence, with an initial capacity of 15,000 horsepower.

Washington, Nov. 22.—The investigation of the proposed freight advances in the eastern trunk line territory was resumed before the interstate commerce commission today by the shippers' contending the proposed advances were excessive.
