

# MANIPULATION OF BUTTER PRICES

### Insurgent Movement in Elgin Butter Board Brings Its Doings Into the Limelight.

## PUBLIC SIMPLY SWINDLED

#### Weekly Naming of Opening Prices Is Done Under Farcical Conditions.

New York, Nov. 29.—An "insurgent" movement on the part of Chicago members of the Elgin butter board has brought into the limelight alleged manipulation of prices by that body and assures a bitter fight for control at the annual election to be held on Dec. 19.

For more than a quarter of a century the quotations of the Elgin board have served as a basis on which butter was bought and sold in practically every part of the United States.

That the naming of the opening price each week has been done under farcical conditions, during recent years at least, is the chief contention of the Chicago members who have been making a fight for lower figures since the first of the year, when the board arbitrarily posted a price of 36 cents.

## SURROGATE HOLDS COURT ON MOVING TRAIN

Monticello, N. Y., Nov. 29.—Passengers on a train between Port Jervis and Binghamton were treated yesterday to an odd scene when W. L. Thornton, judge and surrogate of Sullivan county, held surrogate's court between those two points as the train was speeding on its way.

Judge Thornton had made arrangements to hear the protested will case of the late George W. Gould of New York, and when he was called suddenly to Binghamton, he decided to hold court on board the train. Accordingly, the Gould heirs and their attorneys joined him at Port Jervis. At the time the train had left the station, the party was in the midst of the proceedings, which continued to within a short distance of Binghamton. Judge Thornton pronounced a decree within two weeks. The value of the estate is about \$200,000.

Binghamton, N. Y., Nov. 29.—Dorris Hill, a well-to-do farmer, who drove his family from their home at Morris, N. Y., at the point of a shotgun last week and who had been held in jail there pending the arrival of an attendant to bring him to the insane asylum in this city, escaped commitment as a lunatic by setting fire to his bed in the jail last night. He was burned to death.

## MEDAL AWARDED JOHN FITZGERALD

Washington, Nov. 29.—The award of a medal of honor and a gratuity of \$100 to John Fitzgerald, an employee of the New York custom house, but formerly a private in the United States marine corps, was approved yesterday by Asst. Secy. of the Navy Winthrop. A recommendation that such an award be made was one of the last official acts of Gen. George F. Elliott, commandant of the corps, who will be retired today. Fitzgerald served during the Spanish-American war and distinguished himself in Cuba by wiggling a signal to the U. S. S. Dolphin while the Spaniards were sending bullets whizzing past his ears. He was in the command of Gen. (then Capt.) Elliott at the time.

Burlington, Vt., Nov. 29.—Matthew Henry Buckham, for 35 years president of the University of Vermont, died early today of bronchial trouble after an illness of only a few days. He was 78 years old.

## JONATHAN DWIGHT DEAD

New York, Nov. 29.—Jonathan Dwight, retired engineer and railroad builder, is dead at his home here in his eightieth year. He was a second cousin of President Timothy Dwight of Yale, but was born in Boston and graduated from Harvard in 1852. He raced which was rowed in 1852 on Lake Winnepesaukee, Harvard winning. After leaving Har-

vard, Mr. Dwight went to West Point and studied civil engineering. Leaving West Point he went west for a while and helped build railroads. He had a great part in the building of one of the great railroads across the Mississippi, called at that time the Hannibal and St. Joe.

In 1878 he settled at Madison, N. J., as a consulting engineer, and was for a long time one of the chief engineers of the New York Central. He had charge of laying the foundations of the statue of Liberty.
