TO EQUIP PLAYGROUNDS. Up to Council Now to Favorably Consider Requests.

Salt Lake's children will have a place to play where all advantages of the modern playground will be afforded them if the recommendation of the board of park commissioners and the council committee on playgrounds and waterways, decided upon in conference last evening, is carried out by the city council.

For the purchase of the estimated that \$2,500 would be necessary, and a resolution was adopted, to be presented to the city council recommending that such an amount be appropriated for the use of the park board in installing a public playground in the center two and a half acres of Pioneer park, on Third South between Second and Third West. The adoption of the resolution was unanimous.

Other action of the conference was the authorization of the purchase of 15 Grecian pedestal vases of concrete, patterned after the ones which are used as a corner of the city and county building grounds. These will be used for ornamentation about the city and county grounds and at the city hall.

It was also decided to request the city council to appropriate \$1,500 additional for the use of the park commission in completing the work of the administrative year.
