

BRILLIANT AFFAIR MARKS OPENING

Hundreds of People Attend Exhibition of Art Institute at Vermont Building.

ADDRESS BY JUDGE W. H. KING

State Should Make More Provision for Fostering Art—Pictures in Competition for Prizes.

A brilliant affair marked the opening of the Utah art institute last night in the big reception given at the Vermont building, about 50 people being present. Beautiful gowns were in evidence, the strains of delightful music pervaded the hall, and the walls hung with beautiful pictures, perfect what was a most inspiring scene. The attendance marked the keen interest taken by local art lovers in native talent, and the work about the room the genuine merit by which it is wrought. A touching tribute of loyalty to John H. Hensley's memory is shown in the excellent place accorded a collection of paintings done by the artist, and on all hands the evidences of remaining artistic talent are seen to spur into material activity some of the appreciation manifested by local residents in local art. They include oil and water color landscapes, marine pieces, figures and flowers, a list of subjects too numerous to mention, all of which were reviewed with interest by the throng assembled last night.

JUDGE KING'S ADDRESS. The ceremonies were opened officially by President Edwin Evans of the Institute, who in a brief speech expressed his pleasure with the exhibition and the interest shown by the presence of the large assemblage. He then introduced Judge W. H. King, who spoke of the importance of recognizing genius as a part of the true wealth of a state. He made special point of the fact of Utah's many exponents of art who have had so little encouragement here at home as to have been forced to go abroad for means of subsistence in their chosen vocations.

GOAL COMBINE IS AGAIN UNDER FIRE

City Council Resolves That Legislation Should Enact Stringent Law.

Liquor Regulation Sleeps. City Fathers Decline to Waken the Slumber Resolutions Introduced Some Time Ago.

Having resolved with every other civic body in the state, imploring them to take action against the coal trust, the city council, in Monday night's session, passed another resolution telling the legislature, which will convene next month, that it believes it, the legislature, should take definite action looking toward more stringent laws governing corporations in general.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted: "Whereas, section 15 of article 12 of the constitution of the State of Utah, provides as follows: 'The legislature shall pass laws establishing reasonable maximum rates of charges for the transportation of passengers and freight, for correcting abuses, and preventing discriminations and extortion in rates of freight and passenger traffic by the different railroads and other carriers within the state, and shall enforce such laws by adequate penalties; and

Whereas, notwithstanding said maximum rate provision of the constitution, and notwithstanding that 14 years have elapsed since the adoption of said constitution, no laws have been enacted by the legislature for the purpose of carrying into effect said constitutional provision, but each succeeding legislature has failed to perform the duty enjoined upon it by said provision, and

Whereas, by reason of the failure of the legislature to enact laws in accordance with said constitutional provision, the people of the State of Utah have for many years suffered and continue to suffer from excessive and unreasonable transportation charges, not only upon coal, but upon other necessities and commodities, and

Whereas, the time has come when the people of the State of Utah should demand and insist upon their representatives in the state legislature doing their plain and imperative duty by enacting such legislation as will carry into force and effect said constitutional provision and as will protect the people from excessive rates; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that this council, in behalf of the people of Salt Lake City, does hereby petition the legislature to enact and pass, the incoming legislature to give this important matter careful consideration and investigation, and then enact such laws, in pursuance of said constitutional provision, as in their wisdom they may deem just and proper for the protection of the people and for putting into effect said provision, and to be further

Resolved, that the city recorder be, and he is hereby, directed to make a sufficient number of copies of this resolution for presentation to each member of the legislature, and that upon the convening of said legislature, he cause to be transmitted to each member thereof a copy of this resolution.

LIQUOR REGULATION. The matter of regulation of liquor licenses was also passed a step closer to the legislature by being totally ignored. The board of park commissioners' deficit of \$8,000 took the attention of the council, and for no small part of the session, and the explanation from the board were listened to. Members of the board are desirous that next year's budget for park purposes be made long on one end, namely, the first end, so that the 1910 deficit will be partially covered. They believe in this manner and by shortening up on next year's expenditures they can almost wholly eliminate this deficit.

Report from the municipal laws committee conveyed the information that so far as a constitutional interference is concerned, A. O. Whitmore can build as many garages as he wants on east South Temple street or any other street in the city. His garage, a two-story brick, is now in course of construction at 430 east South Temple.

Report from Chief Enlow, recommending the appointment of J. H. Jones as special officer for the Rio Grande yards and that the liquor license of Nicholas Lamont be revoked, were approved. The latter was amended in a resolution by Councilman McKinney, calling Lamont before the council to show cause why his license should not be revoked and this was adopted.

Fire Chief Glone's report of the suspension of William Schade for 10 days without pay was approved. The recommendation of the committee on public grounds and waterways that \$2,500 be allowed the park commission for installing apparatus in the children's playground at west Third South, in the center of Pioneer park, was referred to the committee on finance.

A draft of the franchise desired by the Utah Light & Railway company, providing for the extension to the city limits at Thirtieth South was presented and referred to the committee on municipal laws.

A misunderstanding between the council and the Utah Gas & Coke company relative to a city account for \$2,307.56, presented at a recent session of the council and held for further investigation, was referred to the finance and salaries committee.

The council was asked by F. W. Little, if it could not make the overflow from Warm Springs run in the new Little dam, the water is overflowing the lands north of the springs and breeding disease. City Engineer McGonagle recommended the institution of condemnation proceedings to prevent the city to go ahead with the widening and deepening of the surplus canal, work on which was stopped by an injunction issued by the United States court to Newell H. Clayton last week. This was adopted.

Payrolls for the last half of the month of November, aggregating \$5,522.25 for the several departments were approved.

SUCCESSFUL BAZAAR.

Amusement Event in Thirtieth Ward Proves Big Attraction.

With a crowd that outlasted anything ever seen in the ward the holiday bazaar of the Thirtieth ward opened last night for a run of a full week. It is estimated that more than 300 people attended the opening. At any rate the rooms of the amusement hall in which the booths had been arranged, were one mass of people from evening until nearly midnight.

The principal feature of the evening was a moving picture show in the amusement hall. This proved a big attraction, especially to the young people and the

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three performances were given to crowded audiences. On the stage a modern cafeteria had been established and here almost the entire ward population assembled to have gathered for the evening meal. The rush was much larger than was expected and before 9 o'clock had arrived the cafeteria had to suspend operations on account of a lack of supplies. The "queen" voting contest kept interest at fever heat all during the evening, and when it seemed that Core Pusgar, the favorite, had won the evening's voting in a walk, Vera Price, a dark horse came up strong and ended with more than a thousand votes to her credit, thus leading for the evening. The contest will continue until Friday night, when the lady with the highest number of votes will be crowned queen of the carnival. The various booths were in charge of the auxiliary organizations of the ward and had been tastefully decorated and filled with articles of a pleasing nature. Each booth had attractive young ladies in attendance as well as a large number of "spotters" on the outside.
