REPUBLICAN PLEDGES.

The Republican party will enter into power on the fourth day of next month pledged, first of all, to a reduction of the revenue without destroying or weakening the American system of protection. Republicans are as firmly pledged as Democrats to bring the receipts of the government to a level with its expenditures.

It is probable that the Republican plan of revenue reduction will be on the general lines of the senate tariff bill submitted to the country during the last days of the recent session. Of course it is not likely that this bill will be adopted entire, but its general features will doubtless appear in the tariff law which is finally adopted by the Fifty-first congress.
