James G. Blaine Speaks on American Commerce. THE SYSTEM OF RECIPROcity. Citizens of Waterville Listen to a Masterly Address. The Source of Imports and the Destination of Exports Examined Into and a Balance Struck to Show the Adverse Result.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—A public meeting was held tonight, and afterwards Burleigh had spoken President Small, of Georgetown, introduced the leader of the Republican party, and the speaker of a progressive protective tariff, Hon. James G. Blaine. In regard to national questions, Blaine said: "I wish to declare it as my opinion that the United States has reached a point where one of its highest duties is to enlarge the area of its foreign trade. Under the beneficent policy of protection we have developed a volume of manufactures which in many departments overruns the demands of the home market. In the field of agriculture, with the immense population given in it by agricultural implements, we can far more than produce breadstuffs and provisions for our own people. Nor would it be an ambitious destiny for so great a country as ours to manufacture only what we can consume, and produce only what we can sell."

FRANCE WILL RECIPROCATE. American Pork Received to Set Off French Art. PARIS, Aug. 29.—Le Paris says negotiations between France and the United States relative to the American tariff are approaching a favorable conclusion. The Washington government has agreed to remove the prohibition against American pork as a result of the negotiations of the Senate finance committee. Aldrich said he knew nothing about any negotiations of the two governments which he had not already announced to the public. He said he had no communication with either party. The finance committee will probably recommend that the duty be reduced to 10 cents per cwt. for French, but all foreign art. Threatened Discontinuance of Neah Bay Station. LIFE SERVICE INADEQUATE. A Foolish Claim That There is Nothing for the Crew to Do. Port Townsend Urging Decisive Action for the Fortification of Commerce—A List of the Vessels Wrecked Off Cape Fattery.

PORT TOWNSEND, Aug. 29.—There is great danger that a negligently administered policy on the part of the government will result in the threatened discontinuance of Neah Bay station. The life-saving station at Neah Bay was woefully inefficient and that in case of disaster at the mouth of the Straits of Juan de Fuca, the assistance could be rendered from the shore. In reply to requests for a better station at Neah Bay, S. I. Kimball, superintendent of the life-saving service, has written a letter to the Chamber of Commerce here, in which he claims that the station is inefficient and that the statistics gathered by congress under the act of June, 1874, relating to this subject show that there have been only two casualties to vessels in the vicinity of Neah Bay, neither attended with loss of life, and the damage amounting to only \$2,000 in all.
