OMAHA, Nov. 22.—[Special].—S. H. H. Clark, vice-president of the Missouri Pacific, yesterday received a telegram to repair at once to New York to hold a consultation with Jay Gould.

In conversation with an official of the Union Pacific railway, he stated that while he had no definite information upon the subject he had no doubt that Jay Gould was in control of the Union Pacific railway, and that Sidney Dillon was to be made president as a matter of vindication, and a vice-presidency would be created.
