THE INJUNS COMING IN.

Whole Body of Hostiles Camped Near Pine Ridge.

GEN. MILES READY FOR THEM.

A Day of Expectancy and Apprehension at the Agency.

Old Red Cloud Attends Church—Unconfirmed Reports of Outbreak of Turtle Mountain Warriors—The Okanogan Scare Apparently Not Well Founded.

PINE RIDGE AGENCY, Jan. 11.—A band of hostiles this morning killed a number of cattle belonging to friendly and some miles from the agency. The latest report at midnight is that the hostiles are about five miles from the agency.

As to the time of coming into the agency, that point does not concern the Indians. So many times have they commenced to come in without keeping the promise, that no reliance can be placed in them.

Father Jute, the Jesuit missionary who has done such good work among the hostiles, said today that he will reside at the agency, nearly five miles from the agency. It was at this point that the hostiles were to have camped last night.

Lieutenant Taylor, in charge of the scouts, has sent one of his men to ascertain the location of the hostiles, and the number moving this way. This afternoon Lieutenant Bettes, of the Ninth cavalry, came in and announced that Colonel Henry's command had moved on White river, seven miles nearer the agency.

Gen. Brooke marched about six miles today, and his position on White Clay creek has been taken by Colonel O'Leary. These two commands will follow the Indians and are now behind them but six miles.

Captain Pierce arrived today. He said in response to questions that he did not care to talk of matters at the new post today, preferring to look over the ground and familiarize himself with the affairs here.

Seven girls, inmates of the school here, escaped last night and joined friends outside. They have not yet been found.

The religious services here today were very meager. In the government school, where Presbyterian services are usually held, the windows were barred, and about the building were a number of infantrymen behind barbed wire.

New York, Jan. 11.—General O'Brien received a letter tonight from Father Cretz at Pine Ridge, saying that the Indians were proving rapidly. Speaking of the Wounded Knee fight, he says the Indians fired first and the troops were not to blame for the wholesale killing, as everything was done at close quarters.

St. Paul, Jan. 11.—An Orléans, S. D., special to the Pioneer Press says: Red Blanket and one of Young-Man-A-Fraid-of-the-Blacks arrived here this afternoon with a band of 100 followers, en route back to Pine Ridge from a hunting expedition to the Big Horn mountains.

St. Louis, Jan. 11.—A special to the Republic from Deloraine, Man., says: A report has reached here that a skirmish occurred this morning between the Canadian mounted police and the Turtle Mountain Indians at Fish Lake, on the boundary. One policeman and three Indians are said to have been killed.

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SCHISM IN THE CHURCH.

A Tacoma Pastor Resigns and Demands His Salary.

STEAMER TYPHOON BURNED.

Bookkeeper of the Utsalady Mill Kills Himself While Hunting.

John Keifer, a Wealthy Citizen of Olympia, Stabs Himself to Death—Portland Society Youth Hiding from the Police—A Boy Fatally Hurt.

TACOMA, Jan. 11.—[Special.]—Rev. Benjamin F. Rattray this morning resigned the pastorate of Calvary Baptist church. Among the reasons given for this action by Rattray are: Withholding of his salary by the congregation on the ground of financial embarrassment when an extraordinary measure was manifested in the church management, the superintendent of the Sunday-school going so far as to offer \$10 to every scholar remaining in the classes till January 15.

Of the \$182 due him, Rattray is promised half tomorrow, and the balance in two weeks. The trouble seems to grow out of the fact that the congregation is close communion, while Rattray favors fraternizing.

EARLY CLOSING NOT FAVORED. Retail Merchants of Tacoma Resolve to Keep Open House Till 8 p. m. TACOMA, Jan. 11.—[Special.]—The meeting of retail merchants held this afternoon at the Tacoma hotel was attended by P. Posner, J. Kullman, E. Schlinger, M. Cohn, Merritt Brothers, J. Bomard, Chester Cleary & Co., Mr. Dickson, N. E. Neary and Charles Leichenbach.

WHEREAS, At a meeting of the Tacoma Retail Merchants Association held December 28, 1890, a resolution was passed to the effect that places of business of the city should be closed at 6 p. m. of each day; and WHEREAS, It has been proved that closing the retail business of the city at that hour is detrimental to the business interests of the city generally, and unsatisfactory to the general public; therefore, be it resolved, that the Tacoma Retail Merchants Association do that resolution be amended, and that we close our stores at 8 p. m., except on Saturdays.

For several months the retail clerks' association of the city has been working tooth and nail to secure early, or 6 o'clock closing of retail stores. Grocers Brothers have not joined the merchants' association and will continue to close at 6 p. m. as usual.

TACOMA BRETHREN ORGANIZE A SOCIETY FOR THE RELIEF OF THE RUSSIAN JEWS. TACOMA, Jan. 11.—[Special.]—The Tacoma relief society was organized this afternoon for the purpose of protecting against and relieving the inhumanities perpetrated against the Jews in Russia.

STEAMER BURNED AT HOQUIAM. Northwest Lumber Company's Boat, Typhoon, Destroyed—No Insurance. OLYMPIA, Jan. 11.—[Special.]—Word was received here today that the steamer Typhoon was totally destroyed by fire at Hoquiam, on Gray's harbor, last night.

FATALLY HURT IN RUNAWAY. Little Son of George Redings, at Marquam, Or., Killed by Fractious Team. PORTLAND, Jan. 11.—[Special.]—News of a shocking accident near Marquam, Or., has just been received. While a little son of George Redings was driving a fractious team attached to a wagon the boy was thrown from his seat upon the doubletree and dragged some distance before being extricated.

CONSPIRACY TO ROB ALLEN & LEWIS—ONE THIEF IN JAIL. PORTLAND, Jan. 11.—[Special.]—Chris Johnson, one of the men believed to be implicated in the larceny of a large quantity of goods from Allen & Lewis' wholesale grocery store, was arrested last night and is now in the city jail.

SLICIDE NEAR OLYMPIA. John Keifer, aged 54, stabbed himself—Hurt as he was. OLYMPIA, Jan. 11.—[Special.]—John Keifer, aged about 54, committed suicide this evening at his home, Tumwater. He first shot himself four times without effect and then secured a knife and stabbed himself. He was well known here and was a large property-owner.

TACOMA SENDS A BAD CITIZEN TO PORTLAND. TACOMA, Jan. 11.—[Special.]—Samuel Brink, who attempted suicide Wednesday because his wife would not live with him, this evening was sent to Portland. Should he return and persist in dogging his wife, seeking money from her, Mrs. Brink's uncle, Postmaster Hogue, will prosecute him on behalf of Mrs. Brink.

U. S. MARSHAL DILL, OF PENNSYLVANIA, DEAD. PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 11.—Andrew C. Dill, United States marshal for the eastern district of Pennsylvania, died today.

THE WORK WELL BEGUN

Legislature Will Elect Squire and Pass Good Laws.

GOSSIP ABOUT THE LEADERS.

Last Session's Problems Solved and Out of the Way.

Scenes in the Senatorial Camps—"General" Ewing Returns—Appropriations Will Not Exceed the Revenue—Changes in the Tide Land Law.

OLYMPIA, Jan. 11.—[Special.]—Notwithstanding the distracting influence of the senatorial question, both houses have already manifested a disposition to settle down to business. Permanent organization has been effected, rules adopted, the salaries of employees mostly fixed, the Senate committee appointed, and the House committees will be named by Speaker Shaw tomorrow.

The members express themselves as generally satisfied with the manner in which President Wilson distributed the appointments of the Senate committees. Every member gets a chairmanship, and some of them two. The Democrats were given fair representation and secured four chairmanships, one for each. Kinnear of King is chairman of the judiciary committee, which position he filled so capably last session.

Forrest of King secures the committee on revenue and taxation, for which his experience and qualifications fit him. The committee is likely to be one of the hardest-worked of the session. Owings, who had the chairmanship of the committee on corporations a year ago, is displaced by Van Houten of Spokane. McCroskey, a Whittman county Democrat and a member of the Farmers' Alliance, is chairman of the committee on agriculture. Owings is allotted to the committees on public buildings and grounds, and on constitutional revision.

Lucas, who is a physician, gets the committee on medicine, surgery and hygiene, and also the committee on appropriations, the latter of which is very important. Rutter is assigned to the committee on labor and labor statistics. Frink gets the manufacturing committee. Thompson, who was the county clerk of public morals, now has charge of the committee on memorials. Eshelman of Yakima, a minister of the Christian denomination, displaces Thompson on the former committee. Dyer, who was a militia colonel in the East, has the committee on military. Hyde of Spokane is chairman of the committee on municipal corporations. Edens of Skagit is the head of the committee on roads and bridges, in which his county is particularly interested.

Van Houten has the committee on tide lands, which may or may not be of great importance. It is a large committee. Smith of Whittman gets counties and county boundaries. In case a new attempt is made to divide Whittman or any other county this will be to handle the matter. What was the committee on insane. He is from Spokane county, in which the Medical Lake asylum is located. The committees are divided among the three leading counties as follows:

Patience—Judiciary, labor, manufacturers, military, public revenue and taxation, salaries and mileage. Education, engrossed bills, printing, state granted and school lands, state library. Spokane—Corporations other than municipal, municipal incorporations, state insane.

Everybody is interested, of course, in knowing how much the present session of the legislature will cost, and what will likely be the amount of the appropriations. In his report the state auditor makes an estimate of receipts and expenditures for the two years beginning April 1, 1891, and ending March 31, 1893. They are as follows:
