Gen. Miles Says Red Men Never Submitted Better.

REVELLUP COMMISSION ARRIVES.

RevelLup to be Examined and Indians Asked About His Value.

TACOMA, Jan. 15.—[Special.]—United States Senator C. D. Drake, of Washington, Judge George B. Kinkead, of Lexington, Ky., and State Senator D. Harness, of Kokomo, Ind., constitute the commission appointed by President Harding to investigate the Puyallup Indian reservation.

General Brooks was ordered to march with his command below the mission to this point, and will camp on the west bank of White Clay creek, immediately north of the mission, while another will camp on the west bank of south.

The advance guard of the hostiles had secretly reached the agency on the night of the 12th and had collected the arms of his followers and wanted to surrender them to the agent.

When the wagon camp in the morning consisted of simple two-barreled shotguns, a Henry rifle, two shotguns, a Winchester, two sharp's rifles and one Winchester, nine guns in all.

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HE VIOLATED POSTAL LAWS.

New York Agent for European Swindlers Under Arrest.

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—Edward H. Horner, banker at Wall street, has been arrested for sending lottery tickets through the mails.

The arrest was made on the strength of indictments found against the prisoner in Springfield, Ill. Inspector Conrad, speaking of the case, said Horner is chief agent in this city of the various indemnity bonds of Austria, Hungary and other foreign countries.

Horner, the latter, according to the statement of the inspector, acknowledged that he is interested in the amount of \$125,000, and that his yearly expenses exceed \$125,000. He maintains branches in Philadelphia, St. Louis, Chicago, Milwaukee, Denver, Birmingham, Ala., San Francisco, St. Joseph, Mo., Mexico and South America.

BUCKETSHOP BROKERS OF BUFFALO A HALF-MILLION SHOT.

BUFFALO, Jan. 15.—Allen & Co., bucketshop brokers, have decided to close their business. Their losses aggregate fully half a million.
