CALIFORNIA ELECTION RESULTS. Republicans Get Only One Elector and Three of Seven Representatives.

SACRAMENTO, Dec. 27.—Some of the returns of the general election were officially declared today by Secretary of State White. The vote for presidential electors was:

Republicans—L. Hanson, 117,367; J. R. Wilbur, 117,665; H. V. Morsehouse, 117,711; Isaac Hecht, 117,613; J. A. Waymier, 117,717; M. L. Merry, 117,730; William Carson, 117,717; J. C. Campbell, 117,743; Thomas R. Baird, 118,027.

Representatives—J. A. Filcher, 118,151; William Gray, 118,197; R. P. Gammoh, 118,112; J. D. son Hetch, 118,092; R. A. Long, 118,174; J. D. Lynch, 118,021; M. Rosenthal, 118,085; W. L. Sullivan, 117,962; J. F. Thompson, 117,940.

This shows that California cast one vote for Harrison, that for Thomas R. Baird. The People's party vote ranged from 25,170 to 25,311, and the Prohibition vote from 7,921 to 8,916. Propositions were voted upon as follows:

Elections of United States senators by the people—For, 187,508; against, 183,342. San Francisco deposit act—For, 91,213; against, 90,443.

Educational qualification—For, 161,320; against, 43,999. Retaining debt—Yes, 79,900; no, 85,604. The vote upon amendments was as follows:

To have the legislative session last 100 days—For, 36,442; against, 153,801. Not permitting the incurring of debt by a county, city or township bond of education—For, 15,941; against, 98,558.

Increasing the salary of lieutenant governor—For, 43,456; against, 128,743. Permitting the governor to appoint certain appropriations in a bill while rejecting others—For, 63,286; against, 97,708.

NATIONAL BANKING LAWS.

A Bill With Important Provisions Now Before the House Committee.

WASHINGTON CITY, Dec. 27.—The committee on banking and currency will be called together soon after recess to act on a bill introduced by Representative Andrew, imposing more liberal legislation on behalf of the national banks and the repeal of the silver bullion purchase clause of the Sherman act.

The committee is in favor of a reduction of the rate of tax on national bank circulation, but is opposed to wiping the tax out entirely, on the ground that the banks should bear their share of the expense of the system. Section 4 repeats the Sherman silver purchase provision. Whether or not this will get favorable indorsement of the committee cannot be predicted.

Riot at a Kentucky Dance. DOVER, Ky., Dec. 27.—At a dance at the home of Walter Green (colored) a fatal shooting and riot occurred as the result of a dispute over a trilling matter. In the melee four negroes were shot. Ruth Fields was wounded with a shotgun by Green as he was dying. Green's intention was to shoot Charles Whaley, and the woman stepped in the way to protect Whaley. The latter was afterwards dangerously wounded. Charles Perry got three bullets in his body, and another negro was fatally hurt. Green's house was stoned and windows and doors broken. Peace officers who attempted to arrest the rioters met with resistance and a large number of shots were exchanged, in which a number were wounded. The rioters finally escaped.

A Bank Charged With Usury. CHICAGO, Dec. 27.—Allison Schaffer & Co., railroad contractors of New York, who have a contract for the elevated World's fair track, the Illinois Central railway, borrowed about \$300,000 from the Western National bank of New York. Last month the bank began suit to recover the amount, and today the defendants entered the plea of usury, setting forth that the bank, besides charging the legal 6 per cent, exacted a bonus of 20 per cent. for making the loan, contrary to the laws of the state of New York, thus rendering the notes void. Notwithstanding this the bank proceeded to sell and bought in for the ridiculous sum of \$16,000 securities put up as collateral to the amount of \$1,200,000. They ask that the notes be cancelled and the securities returned.

Chinese Appeal to Supreme Court. BUFFALO, Dec. 27.—An attorney has been retained to carry the case of Wong Sing Chung, a Chinaman recently arrested on the Niagara frontier under the exclusion act by United States officers, to the supreme court by a writ of habeas corpus. Wong was sentenced by a United States commissioner thirty days imprisonment and then he returned to China. He claims to have resided in Baltimore, Salt Lake and San Francisco.

The Detroit Church Trouble. DETROIT, Dec. 27.—The charge against Rev. Welton, who created such a sensation a week ago by withdrawing from the jurisdiction of the presbytery and bringing all the members of his congregation with him, was considered today by the presbytery. A long report was adopted stating that Welton broke the ordination vows and was guilty of willful falsehood. His resignation was accepted.

Drinking Again? CANTON, Minn., Dec. 27.—The session of Assumption church here brought J. J. Collins, of Monroe county, Wis., before S. Boyd today and they made affidavit that they saw a bright star six inches in circumference ascend from the roof of said church on Christmas night.

Is Thurston County Tax Levy Illegal? OLYMPIA, Dec. 27.—[Special.]—A serious question has been raised as to the legality of the tax levy of this county made this year, as the county assessor neglected to swear to the assessment until after the levy had been made and the tax rolls turned over to the county for collection.
