A. M. CANNON IS DEAD.

Found in His Room in a Hotel in New York.

ONE OF SPOKANE'S FOUNDERS.

Its Pioneer Banker, and a Long Time Its Richest Citizen.

He Drove an Ox Team Across the Plains to Denver in 1858, and Went to Spokane When There Was Only a Log Cabin by the Falls—His Business Failure and His Marriage.

New York, April 6.—Anthony M. Cannon, the ex-banker of Spokane, was found dead in his room at the Stuyvesant house today.

Death came from heart disease, from which he had long been a sufferer. His remains will be sent to Spokane and buried in the family vault.

Death was undoubtedly caused by heart failure, as Mr. Cannon had for many years been noted as the man with the lowest pulsation on record. His average pulsation was only 28, except during the

past few months, when it had risen to 44 per minute. No insurance company would accept Mr. Cannon as a risk.

The coroner's physician, O'Shannon, after viewing the remains and hearing the history of Mr. Cannon's case, granted a certificate giving heart failure as the cause of death.

Anthony M. Cannon was born in Illinois in 1817 upon the frontier of American civilization. His father, William Cannon, was an anti-slavery Whig. During Mr. Cannon's childhood and early manhood his parents and their neighbors were poor, and the struggle for existence was often sharp and exacting.

For years Mr. Cannon was the foremost citizen of Spokane, and he was considered the richest man in Eastern Washington. He was one of the delegates to the national Republican convention of 1862.

When the panic of 1858 came it caught Mr. Cannon deep in debt. His banks failed, and he was forced to sell his real estate and the asphalt business in which Mr. Cannon had been engaged, but which had been established with his wife's money.

Mr. Cannon and Mrs. Ward first met in Spokane about two years ago. Mr. Cannon's first wife was then alive, and Mrs. Cannon had only recently secured a divorce from her first husband, Frederick E. Ward, who had dissipated the snug fortune of \$50,000 bequeathed to her by her grandfather Davis.

The first Mrs. Cannon died about six months ago, mourned by all who knew her. On top of this affliction came the failure of the Spokane Falls bank, a private institution of which Mr. Cannon was proprietor, and for all the debts of which he was personally responsible.
