Admiral Stephenson's Ship Stays, Perhaps to Salute the Flag.

KILLED BY A FALLING TREE.

Shocking Death of F. C. Hall, a Prominent Vaughn Bay Rancher. Tacoma, May 5.—Special.—F. C. Hall, a prominent rancher of Vaughn bay, was struck and instantly killed by a falling tree in the clearing of his ranch.

Mr. Hall was engaged in clearing land in an isolated part of the ranch. He felled a huge fir tree, but as it neared the ground it caught in the branches of another tree, and the trunk of the first tree struck him, and he fell to the ground.

His death was a great loss to the community, and his family is in mourning. The cause of the accident is being investigated.

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
