Crushing Defeat of Cuban Rebels. Havana, May 15.—A special dispatch received here today says that on Monday last there was severe fighting in the neighborhood of Joliba, near Guantanamo. The engagement lasted from 5 in the morning till 5 in the evening, and resulted in a brilliant victory for the Spaniards. A detachment of 600 soldiers attacked and fought bravely against 2,000 insurgents led by Gomez, the two Maceos, Rabi and Cartagena.

Nicaragua Pays the Money. London, May 15.—In compliance with the agreement under which the British men-of-war were withdrawn from Nicaragua, on condition that the smart money, £75,000, demanded for the expulsion of Consul Hatch be paid in London within fifteen days, that amount of money was today converted into the treasury of Great Britain on behalf of the Nicaraguan government.

Arms for Nicaragua. Managua, May 15.—The British steamer Debary arrived at Comiso yesterday afternoon. She had on board a quantity of artillery, rifles and ammunition, which were purchased on behalf of the Nicaraguan government in Germany last year.
