

# Salaries Cut Down

## County Employees Suffer Another Reduction.

NEARLY EVERY ONE AFFECTED.

Expenses for June Estimated at \$774 Less Than for April—No Decrease of Deputies.

The county commissioners have made the threatened cut in salaries, and have scaled down the pay of nearly every deputy clerk in the office of the clerk, treasurer, auditor and prosecuting attorney. The reduction has been made in the salaries of the janitors and gardener. All the offices are affected except that of surveyor and assessor, and the latter, it is thought, will receive early attention. The reduction ranges from \$5 to \$20, and according to Commissioner Heaton's figures will lower the county list for June as compared with April \$774, due primarily to the fact that in April the expenses of the treasurer's office were \$1,928, whereas in June the total cannot exceed \$1,154. The cut affects the stenographers most seriously, as their salary has been dropped from \$100 to \$90. The chief deputy in the treasurer's office is scaled down from \$120 to \$100, and the prosecuting attorney's two deputies each have been reduced from \$175 to \$160. Only one salary was cut in the sheriff's office, for the reason that Mr. Van de Venter has already made a radical retrenchment.
