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Carlsruhe Says That Overproduction is the Cause.

GOLD MEETING AT LOUISVILLE.

How Can One Nation Restore the Price of Fallen Silver, He Asks.

Will Endeavor to Control the National Convention of 1896.

Senator Blackburn Attacks Carlsruhe and the President—Free Silver Letter by Senator Morgan—A Goldbug Refuses to Debate With Senator Jones.

Louisville, June 14.—The large personal following of Secretary Carlsruhe in this city, and the keen interest felt by all country for the purpose of controlling the utterance of the next Democratic convention upon the silver question, have been the subject of a meeting of Democrats to honor a party leader.

Promptly at 8 o'clock Mr. Carlsruhe came forward and was presented by C. R. Lott, and reception should have satisfied the most expectant. When the tremendous applause subsided, in his clear, incisive voice, Mr. Carlsruhe made immediate reference to the silver question.

It is insisted, it is claimed, that the fall in the price of silver is attributable to legislation in Germany, the United States, France, and various other countries, during and since the year 1873, and most important of all, to the action of the United States in the year 1890.

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THE LAW OF 1837, signed by Jackson. There was not then a "single gold standard" Democrat in that body. A DEMOCRATIC SILVER LEAGUE.

Will Endeavor to Control the National Convention of 1896.

Memphis, June 14.—The movement inaugurated last night for the organization of a silver organization within the lines of the Democratic party is believed to be a step of the greatest importance in the campaign against the gold standard.

Senator Harris said today: "The league will be purely a Democratic organization for the purpose of securing a perfect organization of the silver Democrats in the country for the purpose of controlling the utterance of the next Democratic convention upon the silver question. I have no doubt the great majority of people are in favor of free coinage, but unless they organize it will be impossible for them to make the next platform."

"Gold men have leisure. They have little else to do but preparing for conventions, and it is therefore possible that while our people are busy in their fields and workshops a very small but powerful organization of our opponents might go to the county and state conventions and control them, and in so doing lay the plan for controlling the national convention, so that a very small, well organized minority will be able to defeat the disorganized majority."

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GERMAN SILVER FOR GOLD.

Slim Chances for an International Monetary Conference.

PRINCE HOHENLOHE'S PROMISE.

He Knew That the Federal States Would Oppose Bi-Metallism.

The Attitude of England an Insuperable Obstacle—Harcourt's Emphatic Declaration Against Silver Disasters—Some of the German Bi-Metallists.

Carlsruhe, June 14.—The Carlsruhe Zeitung says that the grand duchy of Baden does not desire an international bi-metallic conference.

Washington City, June 14.—The preponderance of opinion among public men who have given attention to the progress of the German movement for an international conference looking to the rehabilitation of silver is that the chances for such a congress in the near future are very slim.

There are few who believe that such a congress will be held this year, and many express the opinion that it will be postponed indefinitely.

The action of the minority of the German Federal governments, which is reported to have been decided upon by the bi-metallic movement, is the principal cause of this opinion. Chancellor Hohenlohe is known to be opposed to the silver movement, and has made no declaration in favor of it.

Count Mirbach and other German envoys have been pressing upon the German government the propriety of Germany's taking the initiative in calling the conference, and that he would consider the question in connection with the different state governments of the empire, and now that these appear to have spoken against silver, it is probable that he will probably have a shrewd idea of the possible result, and adopted it as a political device to avoid assuming direct responsibility for a question which is so generally favoring free silver coinage will be sent to the county conventions, and finally none but pronounced advocates of the white metal will be in the national convention.

BLACKBURN AT FRANKFORT.

Frankfort, Ky., June 14.—Senator Blackburn addressed a large audience here tonight.
