

THE ROAD IS NEWBORN

Reorganization Plan of the Northern Pacific.

UNION WITH JIM HILL'S LINE. A Single System—Seattle Steamers for the Orient Would Take San Francisco's Trade.

New York Special to Minneapolis Tribune. The return of Edward D. Adams from Europe has revived public interest in the reorganization of the Northern Pacific railway. This colossal financial undertaking may result in the reorganization of the first of the great trunk lines that defaulted in 1893 or thereabouts, to resume its place among the solvent, credit-paying, prosperous, and safe railroad world.

The Livingston Committee. While the Livingston committee devotes its attention solely to the affairs of the second mortgage holders, whose lien amounts to \$13,250,000, Mr. Adams has an association here for the purpose of proposing to act in the interest of all the owners of the stocks and bonds, making a total sum, nominally, of \$24,750,000.

The terms of that scheme, as already announced, may not be changed. The plan includes the formation of a new company, with \$100,000,000 capital stock, the issuing of bonds limited in amount to \$30,000,000, bearing partly 4 and partly 3 1/2 per cent. interest.

Jim Hill the Master.

The most important feature, perhaps, of the Berlin agreement is the retention by the Great Northern Railway Company of the principal and interest of the new bonds, that corporation receiving in return one-half the capital stock of the reorganized Northern Pacific. The arrangement will serve to bring the two companies into close friendly relations and will lead to actual consolidation.

Mr. Hill knew evidently from the start that he was the master of the situation. He has declared more than once that he had no use for the Northern Pacific system. But he has always been able to adapt himself to new circumstances.
