RECEIVER NICOLL'S FINAL REPORT

Condition of Elevator Property While Managed by the Court.

By the final report of George B. Nicoll, receiver of the Seattle Terminal Railway & Elevator Company, which was filed yesterday in the superior court, it is shown that since going into the receiver's hands on June 15, 1894, the concern has been run at a loss of \$7,644.56, \$5,563.17 for operating the railroad and \$1,513.29 for the warehouse.
