BIBRERY CHARGES FAIL.

Cases Against Smyth and Thompson End With Consent of Smyth.

Tacoma, June 22.—Special.—The "Lexon" committee of the city council has concluded its labors and the results are nil. Today it presented its report to the city council. In it the committee charged that the charges against Councilman Thompson, namely that he accepted a bribe of \$125 to vote for S. J. Smyth as city clerk, and that he attempted to bribe City Attorney Wickersham to let Edmiston run at the Haymarket, have not been proven.
