

YALE WINS, AS USUAL

Harvard Beaten by Thirty-five Seconds, or Ten Lengths.

OUTCLASSED FROM THE START.

A Great Throng on the River—Blue Sky, Rime-Ribboned Girls, and Crimson in Disfavor.

New London, Conn., June 28.—An arm of Yale today defeated the men from Harvard for the thirteenth time since the annual contests were inaugurated between the colleges at Springfield, or Juncos, in 1852. The race was rowed under favorable conditions, and was a fair test of merit, in which Harvard was beaten by 35 seconds, or nearly ten lengths. The distance was four miles on the Thames river, down stream from a point below Gale's Ferry and extending to the big railroad bridge at New London. The official time was: Yale, 23:30; Harvard, 23:05.

Promptly at 2:45 the signal was given, and both crews caught the water at the quick stroke, but the Yale boat soon forged ahead, rowing about forty strokes a minute, while Harvard was doing forty-one. Jennings, substitute for Hollister in the Yale crew, rowed well, and the critics who were on the west side of the river, in praise of his rowing. The Yale men, rowed evenly, and their shell shot through the water smoothly, while Harvard's craft sagged between the strokes. It was soon seen that No. 4 of the latter boat was doing very poor work. He turned on the catch before the rest of the crew. When the half-mile mark was reached the Yale boat had a lead of two lengths, and they slowed down to a stroke of thirty-five, but the wearers of the crimson still kept their stroke above forty. The water was smooth and the conditions were everything to be desired. The body work of the sons of Eli was excellent, while that of the Harvard crew became worse, and No. 4 was splashing badly as the first mile ended. At the mile Yale had increased her lead to three lengths and the men were rowing like a machine. When they passed the mile and a half mark they had not gained any more on their adversaries. The wind changed slightly to the south, which made the water a little rough. Both crews splashed a good deal over the one-half mile light, but the Yale men soon recovered an even stroke of thirty-seven, and the Harvard men were unable to cut down that three lengths' lead at the mile mark.

Bicycle Racing on Trotting Tracks. New York, June 28.—For the past two weeks a movement of the National Trotting Association and leaders in bicycle racing, chiefly in a professional way, has been on foot. It culminated in a meeting today, Hamilton Burby presided, Johnson, Sanger, Tyler and other professionals were represented by David Shafer. The proposition is to form an association for the government of professional cycling and to use the grounds and influence of the trotting men wherever acceptable. Mr. Burby thought the scheme quite feasible, and named several millionaires trotting horse owners with whom he was in communication on the matter. He said many of the trotting tracks, both half

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mile and mile in circumference, would make record breakers, and he believed that with a union of the trotting men and cycling men the venture would be a sporting and financial success.

BOB FITZSIMMONS' TRIAL. No Church Members, Irishmen or Syracuse, N. Y., June 28.—After a three days' effort a jury has been secured for the trial of Bob Fitzsimmons on the charge of manslaughter in the first degree in the killing of his sparring partner, Con Riordan, in an exhibition in this city.

In the selection of the jury the people objected to all the men who had opinions in the case, who favored athletics or were of Irish extraction. The defense objected to church members. Several newspaper men who witnessed the fight were called as witnesses. The general tenor of their testimony was that the gloves worn by the men were large and the boxing time. It was developed that Fitzsimmons, in an interview after the knock-out, said: "Riordan is drunk as a bloody tick." No evidence really damaging to Fitzsimmons was brought out.
