THE CERTIFICATE FRAUDS.

Another Arrest Made, and Warrants Out for Other Conspirators.

Spokane, July 2.--Sensational allegations of mine selling were brought out today in a suit against Charles Crossman by C. P. Oudin. Oudin is a well-known Spokane citizen and mining man, manager of the O. K. mine in the Trout creek district. He claims Crossman with selling him a fourth interest in a worthless mine for \$1,000, claiming that the mine was not properly located, had no lode and that the ore was salted.

THE ALASKA BOUNDARY.

The Dominion Government Sends Expert Ogilvie to Complete Surveys. Victoria, July 2.--William Ogilvie, D. L. S., who is considered the very best authority on the boundary of the far North, arrived from Ottawa last evening. He will leave on the next Alaskan steamer with a party of six picked men for the Yukon country to do work in connection with the Alaskan boundary dispute. The work will not be completed until the fall of 1896, and the party will remain until it is finished.

WHATCOMB'S COUNTY PRINTING.

Whatcomb, July 2.--Special. Willa Van Doren, a farmer living near Ferndale, this town, was accidentally shot and seriously wounded yesterday by his 13-year-old brother, who had just returned from the hunting trip. He playfully pointed a gun at his little brother and told him to throw up his hands. The gun was discharged and a charge of buckshot struck little Willa in the left breast, glancing along the bone and passing through the right shoulder. The boy was brought to St. Luke's hospital today, where his arm was amputated. His recovery is considered doubtful.

THE RETURN OF JOHN W. FOSTER.

Vancouver, B. C., July 2.--Steamer Empress of China arrived this afternoon from the Orient. Among the passengers was Hon. John W. Foster, ex-secretary of state of the United States. He declined to speak regarding his mission to the Orient and his return to the United States.

CORPSE FOUND IN THE COLUMBIA.

That of an Unknown Placer Miner--Buried on the Shore. Wenatchee, July 2.--Special.--Sunday morning word was received at Wenatchee of the finding of a human body floating in the Columbia river about five miles below Wenatchee. The body was in a bad state of decomposition, and had evidently been in the water for some time. It was that of a man about 6 feet tall, weight about 180 pounds, with reddish brown hair and short beard of same color. Middle aged, teeth in perfect condition. He had on a pair of jeans pants with overalls over them; red flannel caps on feet for socks and heavy lace shoes, with leathery boots on his feet. He had no suspenders or shirt on, but around his waist was a rawhide belt with buckle. No marks or scars were found on the body, nor any papers by which he could be identified.

THE BOGUS CERTIFICATES.

More Arrests of Forgers to Be Made in Spokane and Idaho. Spokane, July 2.--Further sensational developments in the bogus Chinese registration certificates conspiracy that were expected today have not come to a head, owing to United States District Attorney Brinker not arriving this morning as expected. He will arrive tomorrow, when, it is said, additional warrants will be sworn out for other members of the conspiracy.

The convention was devoid of enthusiasm.

A Woman Attempts Suicide.

Friday Harbor, July 1.--Special.--Mrs. Burney, a boarding house keeper of this place, sent her little boy to the drug store yesterday for two bottles of laudanum, which she drank. Before drinking it she sent the boy for a neighboring woman, a friend of hers. Her friend was gone from home. The boy returning found his mother sick and informed one of the boarders, who immediately secured help. A doctor was called, and by the most vigorous treatment brought the woman out tonight, and this morning she is resting easy. She claims that she doesn't know why she took the poison, but thinks she must have been beside herself, and she thinks she committed a very foolish act.

The Wreck of the Rosie Olsen.

Victoria, July 2.--Particulars of the wreck of the Victoria steamer, Rosie Olsen, were received by the Empress of China this morning. The vessel struck on a low island twenty miles outside of Hakodate, while entering the latter port three weeks ago. She went to pieces soon after the crew and passengers were rescued.

THE HISSANOY RIOTS.

THE FINANCIAL LOSS \$5,000,000.

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Tokyo, June 21.--Per steamer Empress of China, July 2.--The anti-missionary riots in the Szechuan province supply the exclusive attention of foreigners in China. Many deaths are reported, chiefly among the native Roman Catholics. The loss of property is estimated at \$5,000,000 in the city of Chengtu alone. The French mission at this place was established 150 years ago, and claimed 30,000 converts. The four Protestant institutions were destroyed, and their occupants, including several ladies, are said to be in extreme danger, though the authorities of Peking declare that measures will be taken for their protection.

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Colorado Democrats Evidently Not Interested in Silver.

STATE CONVENTION A FAILURE.

Resolutions Adopted Dissenting From the Administration's Policy.

Secretary Hoke Smith to Address Georgians Against Silver--Cleveland's Letter to Be Read at Tammany's Fourth of July Celebration.

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Denver, July 2.--Just thirty persons were assembled in East Turner hall at 10 o'clock, the time set for the Democratic mass convention for the consideration of the financial question. Chairman Frank Arbuckle, of the state central committee, who called the meeting at the request of the committee, was not present, but had sent an address discouraging radical action, to be read by Secretary Alvin Newell. It was claimed the small attendance was due to a misunderstanding of the time at which the meeting was to be held, and it was confidently expected that the afternoon session would bring out a larger crowd.

Mr. Newell, in his opening address, suggested resolution of the state committee of the government accounted in a measure for the fact that the leading Democrats of the state had sent letters instead of attending the meeting. He spoke in severe terms of the action of certain office-holders in trying to prevent the present meeting, lest something might be said to hurt their political chances. He then read a letter from Charles S. Thomas, national committeeman, who was detained by business in Colorado Springs, strongly endorsing the convention and urging attendance in favor of the free coinage of silver. This was warmly cheered. Organization was effected with Gen. Samuel Browne as chairman, and J. H. McDonald, of Wells county, secretary. The committee on resolutions was selected, after the meeting adjourned 11:30 p. m.

The resolutions reaffirm the devotion of the Colorado Democrats to the principles of Jefferson and Jackson, among which is included the free coinage of silver. This was warmly cheered. Organization was effected with Gen. Samuel Browne as chairman, and J. H. McDonald, of Wells county, secretary. The committee on resolutions was selected, after the meeting adjourned 11:30 p. m.

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THE FRENCH OCCUPY PART OF BRAZIL.

New York, July 2.--Advises received by the Herald from Rio Janeiro state that French troops have occupied the territory of Amapa. The military authorities there have a complete control of the government, asking for reinforcements to resist the invasion. Members of the Jacobin party caused several rows in the streets of Rio. There were frequent fights between Jacobins, naval cadets and sailors during the night. The disorder was finally suppressed by the police.

BULGARIA HEARS THE CRY FROM MACEDONIA.

Philippopolis, Bulgaria, July 2.--The Macedonian question is causing much excitement here. The town last night was placarded with posters reading: "The hour of revolt has struck. The voice of long suffering Macedonia calls for help." The posters were removed by the police, after they were read by many people.

BUSINESS FAILURES.

Pittsburg, July 2.--The iron mills of the Moorehead McLean Company have been sold by the sheriff. The plant is worth \$1,000,000, but the taxes due and sheriff's costs. The purchaser is the New York Life Insurance Company, holder of a mortgage for \$250,000. The creditors of the Moorehead McLean Company had granted the company an extension and taken the mill property for \$500,000. They are left without security and nothing to fall back on.

THE REMOVAL OF COMMANDER IDE.

Washington City, July 2.--Commander George E. Ide saw Secretary Herbert today concerning the orders under which he was relieved from the command of the Alert on the Pacific station. The Alert grew out of a visit paid by Admiral Meade to Panama during the southern cruise last spring. He claimed Commander Ide met himself and Assistant Secretary McAdoo in a hotel and failed to salute him. Ide claims he did salute. It is understood that McAdoo substantiated the report of the admiral. Ide was relieved and the Alert sent from Panama to California, Peru, to relieve the Monterey, under the command of her executive officer, Lieut. J. H. Coffin. Commander Frank H. Hanford has been ordered to command the Alert. No court of inquiry has been ordered, though it is not improbable that Commander Ide may ask for one.
