BARNARD MAY FIGHT.

School Superintendent Claims Three Years' Contract.

INTENDS TO SERVE FULL TIME. Ready to Go Into Court to Enforce His Claim-He Criticizes the School Board's Attorneys.

The question raised by the opinion of White, Munday & Fulton that Superintendent Barnard's contract at the end of the year is likely to be settled in the courts, if the board of education concludes to act in conformity with the opinion.

"White, Munday & Fulton contend that my salary, not having been fixed for three years, the term for which I was employed, but only fixed for one year, terminates the contract at the end of the first year.

"I am acting solely under the direction of the board of education and take no of the board of opinion, as it was unauthorized and called for by the board.

"When I took charge there were sixty-five teachers, and today there are 114, and nearly all the work is doubled, and when the board decided to reduce my salary by 10 per cent, I had no voice in the matter.

"I therefore beg to say that the salary as fixed for the coming year is satisfactory and ask that the salary for the succeeding year be fixed for future consideration.

Mr. King moved that the proposition be accepted, and that Mr. Barnard be engaged at a salary of \$2,500 for one year. The motion was carried unanimously.

DREDGING FOR SPECIMENS

Young Naturalists Gathering Curiousities From the Bottom of the Sound. The Young Naturalists on the W. F. Munroe are gaining many lessons and gathering curious specimens from among the submarine dwellers of the Sound.

"The 'Nats' are swarming these days, and the denizens of the deep are getting wary, as the busy workers spy them out in their rocky retreats at low tide, or dip them up as they disport themselves on the surface in the early morning sunshine, and drag them from the marine fastnesses where they had retired during the noontide hours.

"Promptly at 6:30 o'clock the breakfast going rounds through the camp, and calls forth a volume of impressions on the man who invented early rising, but one can withstand the call and out come the 'Nats'.

"The first expedition dredged from Point Orchard to Point Glover and secured a number of excellent specimens. Yesterday the course lay past Blaney and the whole day was spent around the point and beyond the rocks, bringing up most beautiful seaweeds, and many choice brachiopods, besides numerous asters, one being the scarce caquim, a shell rarely found and very desirable as a specimen.

"What is that?" asked the mate, pointing to a small specimen. "That is a small species of the genus, answered President Hindshaw.

"With each dredge come dozens of curious worm cases, and every one on board has learned that these are daily to be set aside for Mr. Kincaid, whose voracity for worms is unequalled by any young robin that ever fell out of his nest trying to eat his share and that of all his brothers and sisters.
