

SMALL HOPE FOR THE BAWMORE

Origo May Be Saved.

HELP FOR GEN. CAMPOS

United States Fighting the Cuban Filibusters.

AN EXPEDITION BROKEN UP.

Seventeen Men Arrested in New Jersey and Placed in Jail.

They Were About to Sail for Cuba and Had Much Ammunition, Provisions, Etc. - A Quantity of War Supplies Seized in Florida - The Patriots Gaining on the Island.

Wilmington, Del., Aug. 29.-Twenty men were brought in today from Penn's Grove, N. J., and lodged in jail, charged with violating the neutrality laws.

They were about to sail for Cuba and had much ammunition, provisions, etc. - a quantity of war supplies seized in Florida - the patriots gaining on the island.

It has been suspected for several months that a Cuban filibustering party were organizing in this city.

It was learned that they had headquarters at 717 Market street, and that at least one, if not more, expeditions to Cuba have been dispatched from this city.

On Monday the United States authorities were notified by Detective Gaylord of the Pinkerton agency in Philadelphia that another expedition to Cuba was about to take its departure.

United States Marshal Lamm and several assistants, together with the police authorities, have been keeping a close watch ever since.

The filibustering party were organized in the neighborhood of the headquarters, and discovered that many of them had gone to the office of the Charles Warner Company yesterday and chartered the tug Taurus to carry freight to Penn's Grove.

They shadowed the tug until she left her wharf in Philadelphia at midnight last night.

It was known beforehand by the authorities that all of the filibustering party was to wait at Penn's Grove for a steamer to come from Philadelphia to take them to Cuba.

The name of this steamer is not known, but it was learned that she was not expected to arrive at Penn's Grove until midnight tonight.

The filibustering party therefore permitted the men to load their freight and embark their passengers without molestation, and saw them sail in the direction of Penn's Grove, where some of the detectives had been sent to await developments.

At 5 o'clock United States Marshal Lamm, with several assistants, Detective Gaylord and two of his associates and a squad of police under Capt. Kane, boarded a tug and sailed to Penn's Grove.

There they found the party who had chartered the Taurus, lounging about the railroad station and put them under arrest.

They overhauled the freight, when they found a quantity of arms, a large quantity of ammunition, provisions, clothing, etc.

All this was seized and the prisoners have been permitted to make any statement and it is not thought they will be until they are arraigned in court.

An expedition very similar to the one which was broken up to day put to sea in the tug Taurus about three weeks ago and it is understood that its members were safely landed in Cuba.

Chicago, Aug. 30.-Joquin Vergas, ex-Mexican consul here, has received a letter from a friend near to the high Spanish officials in Havana.

It is dated August 22, and has to do with the insurance on that island.

It is daily gaining ground. As a proof, ever since the very beginning the government forces have been the ones who are on the defensive, while the insurgents are the attackers.

Spain began active measures to quell the rebellion in February last with an army of over 70,000 regulars and volunteers.

Of these, through lack of food, disease, she has lost in six months 15,000. In some localities the troops have found themselves in such a perilous situation that many of the soldiers have committed suicide.

While others have lost their reason. The Cubans have fought with unequal bravery, and have so far conquered the Spanish forces.

For instance, the Spaniards leave their wounded comrades on the field to die. They are taken in and cared for by the filibustering party.

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CLOSE OF THE CONCLAVE.

The Knights Going Home - Arrival of the White Squadron.

Washington, Aug. 30.-The twenty-sixth triennial convocation of the Knights Templars is a thing of the past.

The grand encampment wound up its business today, installed its officers, and tonight the last goodbyes are being said to the thousands of Sir Knights who are leaving for their distant homes.

The city is still brilliantly illuminated, and the streets are crowded, but many of the commanders have departed.

At least 5,000 Sir Knights will remain here for some time for pleasure.

The grand encampment devoted almost the entire day's session to the discussion of the triennial convocation.

It was decided to make Washington City the headquarters of the Knights Templars after 1898.

If no invitation is received from the grand lodge of the city, the convocation will be held in that city.

A motion by Past Grand Commander Carson, of Ohio, to levy a per capita tax of 25 cents per year on all Sir Knights was referred to the next convocation.

An invitation was received to hold the first triennial convocation in the grand lodge of the city.

The grand officers were installed by Grand Master McCurdy, and resolutions were passed expressing the thanks of the grand lodge.

The new grand master, Warren N. Thomas, then appointed the following officers: Grand prelate, Cornelius T. Thomas; grand secretary, Thomas C. Morris; grand sword bearer, Edgar S. Dudley; grand warder, Joseph A. Locke; grand marshal, H. H. Thomas; grand treasurer, H. H. Thomas.

The grand encampment then adjourned to meet in Pittsburgh on the second Tuesday of October, 1898.

Four warships of the North Atlantic squadron, comprising the flagship New York, the Minneapolis, Raleigh and Montgomery, dropped anchor in the inner harbor at 7:30 o'clock this morning.

The arrival was announced by the booming of thirteen guns from the flagship.

At 8 o'clock the interesting ceremony of "saluting the flag" was performed.

The salute was answered with a salute of eleven guns from the flagship.

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THE MONTEPELIER AT SAN FRANCISCO.

San Francisco, Aug. 30.-The coast defense vessel Montpelier arrived today from Peru.

She stood the rough weather on the voyage well.
