British Columbia Board of Trade After Kootenay Business.

Olympia, Sept. 8.—Special.—The funeral of George D. Shannon this afternoon was the largest ever seen in Olympia.

TO RUSH THE WORK. Secretary Herbert Orders Work Inexpeditiously on the Navy.

Washington City, Sept. 8.—"It is true," said Secretary Herbert today, "I have given orders that work on vessels and other matters in the navy shall be expedited."

Continuing, the secretary said: "The ships building in the navy yards have been lagging for years. For a long time delay has been the rule."

The secretary deprecates the practice which congress has fallen into of relieving the navy of its obligations.

In conclusion, Mr. Herbert said: "These public ships are a national asset, and it is our duty to see that they are kept in the best of repair."

Clutches 2,000 Victims a Day in Peking.

20,000 SPANIARDS FOR CUBA.

Spain Organizing Another Corps to Help Crush the Patriots.

The German Army Maneuvers at Stettin—Chancellor Hohenzollern to Visit St. Petersburg—The Sultan Presents His Plan for Armenian Reform.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 8.—A Vladivostok dispatch to the Novo Vremya says that cholera is raging in China, and that 2,000 deaths occur daily in Peking.

FOSTER ON THE RIOTS. The Counsel for the Chinese Government Gives His Opinion.

Waterbury, N. Y., Sept. 8.—Hon. J. W. Foster, ex-secretary of state, and the Rev. Dr. Foster, of the Methodist church, were invited to an address on foreign missions here tonight.

The riot formed by me after a careful inquiry and observation is that the masses of the population in China, particularly the common people, are not hostile to the missionaries and their work.

"The war with Japan, which resulted in a humiliating peace and the loss of territory, has greatly weakened the imperial authority, and the disbandment of several hundred thousand troops, mostly without pay, has added to the prevailing excitement for these reasons, but in doing this it is not strange that riots should occur."

"I am, however, in full sympathy with the prevailing demand in the United States that China should be held to a strict account for the crimes she is committing."

"There seems to be, on the part of the public mind in this country, a misconception of the ground upon which our government bases its intervention on account of these riots."

On Armenian Reform.—The Powers Will Not Be Satisfied. Constantinople, Sept. 8.—The dragomans of the British, French and Russian embassies have been ordered to call for the port of reference to Armenia.

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A PICTURE OF THE POPE.

Pale and Emaciated, With the Pallor of Death Upon Him.

HIS INTELLECT IS STILL CLEAR.

He Has an Admiration for American Institutions.

Cardinal Gibbons Preaches a Sermon on His European Trip—The Masses Battered With Heavy Taxes, But Are Happy and Contented.

Baltimore, Sept. 8.—Cardinal Gibbons delivered a sermon today upon the result of his observations during his recent trip to Europe.

"The first subject which naturally occurred to me," said the cardinal, "in my several visits to the pope was his health."

"The pope is a man in his sixtieth year, pale and emaciated, with the pallor almost of death upon him, and this pallor intensified by the white cassock and soutane which he wears."

"The cardinal here drew a brief comparison between the French government and that of the United States with regard to the presence of religion in all branches of our government and the absence of it in France."

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THE ALLIANCE INCIDENT.

Madrid, Sept. 8.—Senor Canovas Del Castillo, minister of foreign affairs, utters a denial of the representations of the United States with reference to the language of the Spanish newspapers in regard to the Alliance incident.

GUARDING THE MONUMENT.

Col. Graham Fears the "Murdered by Strikers" Inscription May Be Injured.

San Francisco, Sept. 8.—Col. W. M. Graham has ordered a guard around the monument at the Presidio cemetery erected in memory of the four privates of Battery L, Fifth United States artillery, who were killed in the Russian wreck and Sacramento last year.

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START FOR THE SOUTH.

Kansas City, Sept. 8.—The famous Iowa State band played at the World's fair, and a veteran company A, of this city, the only company of Revolutionary veterans in existence, left this evening over the Burlington route for Louisville, Nashville, Chattanooga and Atlanta, to take part in the different celebrations to occur at those cities in the near future.

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
