MUGWUMPS LEAVE CONVENTION

The Tammany Saloonkeepers Didn't Get Their Excise Plank.

State Democracy Delegates Are Offered One-Fifth Representation, Which They Reject, Walking Out of the Hall—Tammany Recognized as "the Party" in New York City—Fairchild and Grace to Wage War on Tammany.

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 25.—The Democratic convention finished its work today. Within two hours after the close of the convention the delegates had taken regular and special trains for home, and tonight the town is deserted.

When the State Democracy people left the rink, after being denied more representation, they were in a fighting mood, and continued so until they left the hall at 2:30 p. m.

The New Democratic state committee elected officers as follows: Chairman, J. W. Hinckley; secretary, James Cuniff; treasurer, Perry Belmont.

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DURRANT HAS NO CASE

ASTOUNDING WEAKNESS OF THE DEFENSE AS OUTLINED.

PREACHER GIBSON IS ACCUSED

DEUPREY SAYS EVIDENCE POINTS TO HIM AS STRONGLY AS TO DURRANT.

Dr. Cheney, the Medical Lecturer, Was Announced to Swear to Durrant's Alibi, but Will Do Nothing of the Kind—The Prosecution's Witnesses to Be Impeached if Possible.

San Francisco, Sept. 25.—Dr. W. F. Cheney, who will prosecute the defense in the Durrant case, was disappointed to find that he did not know whether or not the defendant was present in the lecture room of the Cooper medical college on the afternoon of April 3.

"I have been interviewed and questioned on this subject dozens of times since the arrest of Theodore Durrant, and on each of these occasions I have stated that I did not know whether the defendant in the case was present in my class room or not on the afternoon of April 3, 1895."

Dr. Cheney has already been subpoenaed by the defense, and it is probable that he will be called during tomorrow's session.

THE DEFENSE OPENS.

Durrant's Counsel States What He Expects to Prove.

San Francisco, Sept. 25.—The department of the defense in the case of Theodore Durrant, charged with the murder of Blanche Lamont, was opened this morning.
