ON HISTORIC GROUND

A Theater Built Where Seward Was Stabbed and Blaine Died.

Washington City, Sept. 29--The new Lafayette square opera house, built on the site of the old Seward theater, where Wilkes Booth's co-conspirator attempted the life of Senator Seward, and where James G. Blaine died, opens tomorrow night with Lillian Russell in "Daigane."

The theater is on Lafayette square, directly opposite the White House.

The structure is built of polished grey granite and is of classic Greek style.

It has a frontage of 76 feet, and is 16 feet deep.

The building is pronounced absolutely fireproof.

The main entrance is on the east side, and is reached by a wide sidewalk.

The lobby is finished in mahogany and floored in mosaic.

Broad marble staircases on either side lead to the upper floors.

All of the seats are upholstered in the latest fireproof fabric.

The auditorium is divided into stalls, named after the presidents of the United States.

There are 16 proscenium benches, the front of the stalls and balconies are ornamented with wrought steel.

The interior is finished in the style of the Italian renaissance.

The stage, which is equipped with all the latest fireproof rigging, has a capacity of 60 tons.

It is certain, however, that the opera house will be a success.

CHINA MUST COMPLY WITH HER DEMANDS IN FOURTEEN DAYS

OR THE GUNS MAY OPEN FIRE.

English Papers Predict the Downfall of the Manchu Dynasty.

Fourteen English Warships Before Nanking, and the Viceroy's Family and Treasure Are Taken to Shanghai--The Chinese Are Running for Shelter--China in a Perilous Position.

Shanghai, Sept. 29--Falling the entire compliance of the central government with the British demands, it is understood that a fleet of fourteen warships will make a demonstration before Nanking on Tuesday or Wednesday next.

The British demands must be issued degrading the viceroy of the Szechuen, or otherwise the British admiral commanding will act.

Chinese merchants are coming here from every side seeking shelter.
