

THE GUNBOATS TOO.

Two of Them Will Probably Be Built in Seattle.

DETROIT FIRM COMING HERE.

Lowest Bidders Will Establish a Ship-building Plant.

Trouble Over the Treaty With England to Be Avoided by the Construction of the Boats Here—Machinery to Be Made at Detroit and Put Together in Seattle—Description of the Boats.

Following close upon the award to Moran Bros. of the contract for the construction of a government fleet of gunboats is expected in this city daily of the award of the contract for two of the new government gunboats to a company which will build them in Seattle.

The normal coal supply of the single-screw vessel will be 100 tons, with a total bunker capacity of 230 tons. The twin-screw boats will have a normal coal supply of 120 tons; they will be able to carry with bunkers completely filled, 250 tons.

When going under sail alone the engines of the single-screw vessels may be uncoupled, thus allowing the shafting and screw to revolve simply by the action of the passing water. So slight will be the retarding influence of the screw thus disengaged that there is every reason to expect a sailing speed fully equal to the possibilities of steam power.

The composite type of the construction of vessels of the composite type are that they are largely independent of docking facilities, and are independent in the use of fuel.

The character of the services for which the gunboats are particularly designed is such that they may be exposed to musketry fire, and the housing of the principal part of the battery by the water is essential to the strength of the vessels, gives suitable protection to the gun crews in action.

In the naval appropriation act for the present fiscal year provision was made for the construction of six light-draught composite gunboats, the individual construction limit of cost being \$230,000, exclusive of armament.
