The house of bishops this afternoon decided not to elect a bishop of Alaska at present, but to add this territory to the missionary district of Olympia, and place it in charge of Bishop Barker, the present bishop of Olympia.

TO PROTECT THE MISSIONARIES. Congregational Council Wants the Government to Wake Up.

Syracuse, N. Y., Oct. 14.—This was the last day's session of the national conference of the Congregational churches of the United States. Among the subjects on the programme were universal peace, marriage and divorce, prison reform, Sunday observance. The committee on protection of American missionaries abroad submitted resolutions through the Rev. E. G. Northrup, of Clinton, Conn., declaring that "our citizens engaged in religious and educational work abroad are entitled to the same protection from the American government as is given the sailor or trader. We do therefore respectfully ask and confidently expect our government to give full attention to all the possible protection to such missionaries as well as to other citizens living or visiting abroad, and we recognize the faithfulness with which this duty has been performed from time to time. In this particular the wrongs done to our missionaries in the Caroline islands, in China, in Turkey have not been universal protection or punished by the governments responsible therefor. We deeply deplore the massacre in China of a number of missionaries of sister churches, and we actively without any spirit of vengeance, but with a desire for protection, that when possible by diplomatic representations and where necessary by more vigorous action, it may be made clear that our government to its citizens whose work abroad is in honor to our nation and a blessing to these countries in which their labors are expended.

The Rev. Mr. Northrup said that the committee had agreed that more vigorous language would be justified, if it were possible to give full attention to all the possible protection to such missionaries as well as to other citizens living or visiting abroad, and we recognize the faithfulness with which this duty has been performed from time to time.

The report of the committee on religious needs of the army and navy was made by Rev. D. C. Mills, of Cleveland. It contained the most pertinent system, and asserted that there is immediate need of an increase in the number of army chaplains.

Upon the subject of universal peace, the Rev. Henry Hazen, of New York, presented the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted: "Resolved, That this council concurs with any other similar resolutions in this and other countries in a petition on behalf of universal peace, and authorizes the secretary to sign the petition."

The membership of a number of standing committees was announced. The following committee on arrangements for next session was appointed: Rev. Mr. Wallace, Oregon; Rev. D. W. Williams, California; M. H. Hills, Oregon; Rev. L. H. Haddock, Washington; President McClelland, Oregon. The convention adjourned sine die.

WHEAT FROM BIG BEND

It Ought to Come to Seattle, Where Cargo Rate Is Low.

PERMIT FOR G. N. IMPROVEMENTS

Interlocking Switch for Yesler Avenue—The Gunboat Site—Piles Moved to O. I. Office.

A contest seems imminent between the Seattle, Lake Shore and Eastern railroads and the O. R. & N. Co. for the acquisition of the Central Washington, and as the one or the other may gain its object the trade of Eastern Washington will be thrown to Seattle or to Portland. The possibilities of the rich and fertile country of the Big Bend were indicated by the Post-Intelligencer yesterday in an interview with Fred McElroy, president of the O. R. & N. Co. He spoke of the particular need of that section as railway extension. At present Waterville, forty-five miles from Coulee City, the western terminus of the Central Washington, is badly handicapped in respect to transportation facilities, and the rate to export wheat and other products is so high as to be absolutely prohibitive. It costs the farmer and shipper of Waterville 6 cents a bushel to ship wheat by boat to Orondo, nine miles away, and consequently the productive soil of the Big Bend is of little value to the outside world.

But there soon will be a change in this condition of affairs, and it will be made by the construction of a railway. That done, the harvests of one of the richest agricultural sections of the state will be given to the outside market. If the railroad is built, a little construction work would send the grain down the Columbia to be shipped from Portland. Could it be shipped from Seattle? And for that matter why the elevator now here, and still another elevator, should not be filled.

Seattle a Cheaper Point. "Just think of the situation," was a remark made yesterday by a railroad contractor, "if it is in evidence that a half cheaper for cargo than its competitor, yet in the face of that fact two-thirds of the harvest of the Palouse country and Eastern Washington, and that tributary to Seattle, and the grain by natural right should come here. Seattle is nearer and transportation is materially cheaper.

"When the matter of railroad rates was before the last legislature the roads pleaded that to make a lower rate would bankrupt them, yet it is in evidence that last winter the O. R. & N. Co. paid a bonus of \$50,000 for the grain traffic, and that the money was handed over to a Portland firm. I claim that if the railroad can pay that amount it should be forced to make a reduction in the rate. When the transcontinental lines were built everything was sacrificed to the coast, and the theory being that feeders could be built into the productive sections. The time has come when the great trunk lines appear to be robbing the smaller sections of their legitimate share of the grain traffic.

Connect the Local Lines. "What the state needs is a good local railroad system, and the opportunity for such a system is in evidence that the O. R. & N. Co. has less than 20 miles of road would connect the Central Washington with the Lake Shore at Woolley, and an extension of only eleven miles at the eastern end would connect the line with the Spokane & Palouse. By taking proper steps Seattle could gain the entire trade of a section naturally tributary to the Northern Pacific. The competition would be strong, but Seattle, with its low rate for shipping, ought to gain the trade. Portland, it is true, has a number of grain elevators, two of them grain elevators in San Francisco; but it is a fact that as matters now stand some of the grain of Eastern Washington is sent to San Francisco before being put aboard ship.

Will Prove Washington's Wealth. "I would say in reference to the Northern Pacific reversionary that the breaking of the road in two parts, the one making a productive wealth of Washington. Heretofore, the eastern end of that system has been credited with showing the western end its wealth, but the western end has been called poor and far from self-sustaining. I am prepared to say that each mile of road in Washington is worth twenty miles in many portions of the route through the states eastward, and its separate reversionary will show to the world the place Washington should occupy as a productive state. The Northern Pacific has never given us anything but an office building. It has lugged all our products away, and has given the credit for producing them to the eastern end of the system. The time has come when this state can afford to be independent. Let there be a clash of reversionary, and we will not maintain eastern connections through the Burlington at Billings? If there should be a disagreement, traffic from this state would not be interrupted for an instant, but would flow on to Chicago and the Atlantic seaboard serenely independent of the part of the system through the Dakotas, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

PERMIT FOR THE FILL. G. N. Can Begin Work. It's Big Steam Shovel An Interlocking Switch.

The application of the Seattle & Montana Railway Company for a permit to begin filling in its right-of-way south of Yesler avenue, and to build tracks for an entrance to the Jackson street freight grounds, was granted yesterday by the board of public works. That road is now free to commence the extensive improvements in connection with the bonded street. The fill to be made in the Jackson street grounds is extensive, and will require many thousands of cubic yards of earth, which will be obtained from the Great Northern's land at Interbay, where the car shops and yards are to be built. Operations will be greatly facilitated by the use of a Marion steam shovel, which is able to move from 500 to 2,000 cubic yards of earth per day, according to the bank in which it is working. A scoop holding a cubic yard of earth and attached to a ten-foot arm, and worked by a hand crank, can be raised and lowered or swung from side to side at the will of the operator. Three men only are needed, an engineer, freeman and crane-man, and with this force the big shovel can load as many as 100 cars a day. The cars are the Rogers ballast dump cars, thirty-three feet in length, twenty cubic yards each, three times as much as the ordinary flat car. The excavating will begin at the overhead crossing of the bonded street, and will be taken off as far as the arm can reach, when a temporary track will be put in for the work train and another section of earth removed.

From the ore above, a movement of work the fill will be made south from Yesler avenue, where a permanent track will be made, and the foundation laid, and interlocking switch plant. At that point there will be three slip crossings and at least eight other tracks, and all these will be connected by pipe line to a tower and controlled by means of levers. The interlocking switch to be put up on Railroad avenue is similar to that in use at Chicago, and is so constructed as to be absolutely safe, for by a system of derailing switches collision is made impossible. When one track is thrown open the others by the same movement are closed.

SEATTLE'S RELATION TO HAWAII.

Honolulu, H. I., Sept. 27, 1895. To the Editor: In your issue of the 15th instant, in an editorial upon "The Hawaiian Cable," your paper states as an objection to the project that a subsidy of the Hawaiian government is an uncertain quantity. So it may be some day, but as yet, and notwithstanding the changes that have occurred, no obligation of this country has ever been dishonored. There is a high moral business standard here which runs through all classes and all parties, for as yet there are no separatist Populists. I fancy that Col. Spaulding, with his keen business sense, must feel that, should he be successful in persuading the United States congress that their guarantee of returns to the capital he proposes to enlist for a limited amount and time, which will appeal to their Yankee shrewdness as a good investment, his Hawaiian guarantee will be equally safe as any he may have promised by the United States. How about the guarantee to the sugar planters of the South and the bounty?

However, the Post-Intelligencer is correct in that the worth of this project can only be told by an examination of the proposition itself. Col. Spaulding is not a "boomer," and all his past dealings have proven him to be straight business from start to finish. When his plans are made public this characteristic will be evident, and you need have no fear of any ridiculous scheme to "do" the government. As to the cable being a paying venture at the very start, that depends. Do you limit its benefits and results to dollars and cents on its balance sheet?

Is it not more than probable that a cable once laid to these shores by American capital and under American control would be the means of opening up lines from China and Australia (which in any event must land here), and would not American merchants then be in a position to keep pace with the growth of the trade in and on the Pacific?

Already San Francisco is complaining that the Vancouver line is cutting into their trade, and Seattle's exports to this port alone jumped in one year from \$14,000 to \$48,000, and this could be much more than doubled by quick communication; yet opposition to a subsidy will let Vancouver keep pace with the growth of the trade and British capital control the Pacific, and Seattle not in H.
