THE DOOM OF TURKEY

Bloody Massacres Everywhere, the Sultan Powerless.

THE POWERS MUST INTERFERE.

Tens of Thousands of Christians Butchered, and the Mohammedan Craze for Infidel Blood Spreading.

Constantinople, Nov. 6.—The report that the ambassadors of the powers, owing to the recurring disturbances in various parts of the Turkish empire, went to the sultan and urged that adequate measures for the restoration of order be taken, is confirmed in official circles. The representatives of the powers declared that otherwise the powers, acting in concert, would take their own steps in the matter, and the Turkish minister for foreign affairs, Said Pasha, was requested to state what steps the sultan intended to take in order to terminate the present state of anarchy. No definite reply was given on this subject, although the ambassadors were assured that everything possible would be done to restore order. It is evident, in view of the repeated outbreaks, that the powers will sooner or later be compelled to restore order or a flagrant and deliberate violation of international law will be committed. The powers, however, seem either utterly unable or unwilling to put an end to the state of anarchy existing in Armenia, which threatens to bring about a general state of anarchy.
