



ALL NOW SEEK PEACE

The First Presbyterian Church Quarrel to Be Ended.

THREE ELDERS WILL RESIGN.

Stated Supplies to Occupy the Pulpit—Full Text of the Action of the Presbytery.

The action of the presbytery in severing the pastoral relations between Dr. Allison and the First Presbyterian church was evidently a great surprise to the supporters of the pastor. When approached on the subject yesterday they all declared that the decision was so unexpected that they had not considered anything in relation to the future.

The opponents of the pastor were very quiet, stating that the less said the better, and expressing a belief that in a month or two after the meeting of the session would be called the church would be a harmonious body once more.

R. H. Thomson, whose resignation as elder was called for, together with those of Eben S. Osborne and David Meyers, said that he had received no official notice of that fact, but that notice would be given today, after the meeting service, when which he should hand in his letter of resignation. He did not anticipate that any action would be taken to fill the vacancies until the regular meeting in April, and in the meantime the session would consist of nine elders, while the pulpit would be filled by a stated supply, that is, a minister of the Presbyterian faith would be called to take charge of the services from Sunday to Sunday by the session.

The following is the full text of the decision of the presbytery adopted on Friday night:

"Two papers were laid before the presbytery, one a memorial from the session of the First Presbyterian church, of Seattle, setting forth that there existed grave difficulties in said church, and calling upon presbytery to investigate and take measures to remove the difficulties. Another was a petition from certain members of said church, also stating that serious difficulties exist in the church, which affect its spiritual interests.

The testimony made evident the fact that Elder David Meyers has used methods to secure his ends, such as retaining untrue and injurious reports, and thus obstructing the work of the pastor, and the presbytery hereby declares that said David Meyers has by such acts proved himself unfit to hold his position as a member of the session, and he is hereby directed to cease the exercise of the functions of his office.

"The most serious difficulty that confronted the presbytery was in regard to the future relationship of the pastor with the church. After mature deliberation and weighing carefully all matters involved, the presbytery has arrived at the following conclusion: The complications which have developed themselves seem to be of such a character as to seriously cripple the pastor in the successful work of his pastorate, and there does not appear any way by which these complications can be removed while the present relation exists, the presbytery, therefore, with extreme reluctance and deep regret, recommends that the dissolution of the pastoral relation shall take place at the regular meeting of the presbytery in April next.

"The presbytery earnestly and solemnly exhorts all members of the church to drop all resentments, and in the spirit of Christ seek those things which make for the peace and edification of the church.

"The proper officers of the church are instructed to arrange for the payment of the pastor's salary in full to the date when this dissolution of the pastoral relation shall take effect."

RULE FOR TIDE LANDS

State Commission Decides a Ballard Contest.

WILL BECOME A LEADING CASE

Lines to Waterway Determined by General Line and Location of Upland Boundary.

A leading case in the matter of applications to purchase tide lands was decided by the state land commission in the week just closed in Walter P. Sanderson vs. Thomas Winsor and Ida Winsor. Sanderson applied to purchase the east 30.25 feet of lot 4, all of lots 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9, and the west 10.6 feet of lot 10, all in block 3, Ballard tide lands, and the Winsors to purchase a part of lots 7, 8, 9 and 10, block 3, a part of what is marked on the tide land plats as Fourth avenue west. By a stipulation it was agreed that contestants and contestants were owners of adjoining uplands, together with all littoral and riparian rights, and the right to purchase from the state all tide lands abutting the uplands.

The question at issue. The ruling of the commission states that as the act of March 29, 1890 and 1895, declares that owners of lands abutting on tide lands of the first class shall have a preference right to apply for purchase of all or any part of the tide lands in front of the lands so owned, it is apparent that if the lands in contest lie in front of both applicants, neither is entitled to the whole, and some means of equitable partition must be found. The question at issue here chiefly is the right of access to a public waterway across tide flats, and the proportion of the lines of access to the shore line ownership, and the right to purchase submerged or tide lands.

Following the rule which declares that, to ascertain the extent of each proprietor's title on the shore margin, the general line ought to be taken, we may adopt the decision of the supreme court of Michigan in Hildebert and Davis Lumber Co. vs. Peeters. The text of that decision applies to this case where it says: "The line should embrace the general or average line of the shore. This is exactly what the meanders run by the United States government do. The lines are run straight, disregarding indentations and projections, which are not available for any general useful purpose. The shore line in this case is a meander line of the government survey, and we have by that survey the available line not elongated by deep indentations or long projections." Having thus secured a rule for the general shore line, the next question is how should the projections, which are to the line of the waterway in Salmon bay which represents, as it were, the new shore line in those cases where the question is one merely of alluvial increment.

Extensions to the Waterway. "The rule is, the line should be extended as nearly as possible at right angles with the general line and parallel to the side boundary lines of the upland, so as to give each riparian proprietor as nearly the same width at the waterway line as he holds on the shore or general line (35 Mich. 200). In the case of Sanderson vs. Winsor, the rule of division should be: Divide the distance upon the line of the Salmon bay waterway embraced in the applications of said Sanderson and Winsor, into as many equal portions as those contained in the general line in front of them, and then draw straight lines from the point at which the boundary line between the uplands, when projected, intersects the general line to the points thus determined as points of division."
