

INSANE ON RELIGION.

Sad Effect of Church Troubles on W. Dudley Field.

THE DISEASE WAS HEREDITARY.

Brought Out by Allison Dispute—A Cheerful Crazy Scene Painter—Carter Divorce Suit.

W. Dudley Field, a well-known real estate and loan agent, who has been closely identified with the interests of the first Presbyterian church of this city was yesterday declared insane and sent to the Washington asylum at Stella.

The news of Mr. Field's case attracted general attention yesterday and created a profound conversation in the city, where he is well known.

The first suggestion of an unbalanced condition of mind in Mr. Field was noticed in the early part of last week, when he visited the office of his intimate friend, L. T. Turner, and sitting down by the window, explained that he could not bear to see any one talk.

"I want to do all the talking myself," he explained, "and I don't want you to say a word."

He then took up the matter of Dr. Allison's return in the First Presbyterian church and in an excited way discussed the affairs of the church for an hour.

He then returned to the matter of an alleged matter in the street, when Mr. Turner, later he found Field sitting by the window, looking into the street.

Without referring to the conversation of the day before, Mr. Turner said that he was extremely nervous and was not sleeping nights.

Mr. Turner suggested that he go home with him, which Field agreed to do.

In subsequent actions and the excitement produced by anything suggesting the subject troubled Mr. Turner to send him to the Seattle hospital, where he was attended by Drs. Dawson and Eggleston.

It is the opinion that the patient was threatened with brain fever, although very little actual fever made itself apparent at the hospital.

Mr. Turner, during his visit at the hospital, visited him and pass an opinion on the case. During Dr. Waugh's survey of the patient the admission was made by Mr. Field that his mother had been insane.

This admission on the part of Mr. Field led the doctor to take a very serious view of the case.

The hallucinations of a mania frequent and the delusions of a mania more pronounced. The church matters oppressed him more than anything, and he firmly believed that he held the key to the solution of the difficulty.

"If I could see the right people," he said, "I could get everything straightened out. All would be peace and happiness."

Another thing that has presented itself in his clothing and in his behavior is that he is dirty. He refused to drink from a glass unless it came from the crockery store, direct, with the wrapping paper of the store, which would prove that he had never seen drunk from a glass.

It is believed that everything is dirty. He will touch nothing that he thinks has ever been handled before. He has tried to take off all of his clothing and keep it off, in the idea that it is dirty.
