TAX ROLL CORRECTIONS.

At the suggestion of City Comptroller Parry and City Clerk Wikstrom an ordinance was passed authorizing the city to make certain corrections on the tax rolls. The ordinance provides that whenever a delinquent tax receipt for city taxes is presented to the city treasurer and it appears from the tax rolls that no credit has been given thereon for the payment represented by the receipt...

HOUSE OF DELEGATES.

Railroad Franchises—No License for Wandersaloon.

In the house of delegates a resolution was passed authorizing the city engineer to report on the Third Street and Suburban railroad, on which he and the city engineer were last week appointed to report. The city engineer reported that the railroad is about seven and one-half miles in length, and operated under three different franchises...

GETTING DOWN THE HILLS.

Little introduced the ordinance, which came up some time ago, requiring the number of electric wire poles to be reduced to three to a block on all the principal streets, and authorizing the board of public works to remove all those in excess of the number named. W. F. Grambs, of the Third Street and Suburban, said the company had all its surplus poles out; M. P. Backus, receiver of the Consolidated company, said the company would have all its poles out in two or three days, and Dr. E. C. Kilbourne, of the Union Electric company, said his company had some of the last poles that they had, and some of them had not yet been removed, but would be very rapidly. James asked if the gentlemen agreed to finish the work by the 15th inst., and if not, their all agreeing to do this they were granted an extension of time until that date.

NEW ROAD FOR BALLARD.

The committee on streets reported back with a favorable recommendation of the report of Superintendent of Streets Alexander, recommending a road from the west end of Kilbourne avenue to the city limits of Ballard, and an appropriation of \$100,000 to construct it. The street commission is in an ordinance appropriating the sum named, and the report was adopted.

ORDINANCE PERMITTING THE FRYE-BRUHN COMPANY TO LAY A RAILROAD SIDING TO ITS SHEDS ON JACKSON STREET.

Ordinance permitting the Frye-Bruhn Company to lay a railroad siding to its sheds on Jackson street near the Grand street bridge on the tide flats, was put in its final passage, when the president asked if it would not be creating a precedent to give a franchise to a business house. Hurd was pleased to hear there was a business of such importance as to require a railroad, and after a few minutes' discussion, the ordinance passed unanimously.

JUDICIAL COMMITTEE REPORTED ON THE APPOINTMENT OF A STEAM INSPECTOR.

The health and sanitary committee reported an amendment to the penalties, as agreed to by the joint committee, making the penalty for any infraction of the ordinance not less than \$2 nor more than \$100, or imprisonment not exceeding twenty days, or both, at the discretion of the court. The city engineer was authorized to make certain alterations on the tide flats, and the ordinance was passed.

SMALL NUMBER OF DEATHS.

Seattle Upholds Its Reputation as a Bad Place for Undertakers. The year of 1895 will go down in the history of Seattle as remarkable for the small number of deaths. Health Officer Palmer, who has commenced figuring up his annual report of the deaths, causes and number from each cause, said yesterday that the total number of deaths for the past year was 45, as against 467 for 1894. The year 1892 came next, showing up as well as 1893, but missed the notch by figuring up 48. In this connection the fact must also be considered that the population was considerably smaller. In the year 1895 there were 48 deaths in the city. Yesterday there was a death from that cause, but it was an isolated case. Only three houses are now under quarantine for scarlatina.
