TACOMA'S REPUBLICANS BUSY.

The rival candidates for the Mayorship and their supporters have a Test Vote.

Tacoma, Jan. 12.—Special.—For a week past political gossip has been busy with the affairs of the Doolittle Republican Club of this city, with particular reference to the semi-annual election of officers held at the club quarters on C street last Tuesday evening.

The struggle for supremacy was between what is termed at the club the "Canadian element" and the original founders of the organization. T. J. Bell was the candidate of the former and Charles Evans, the present incumbent, was supported for secretary by the latter.

A great deal more than the secretaryship was involved in the controversy, if reports are reliable. Mr. Bell is a relative of Col. G. W. Fife, whose name has been frequently mentioned in connection with the secretaryship. Some of the popular element's friends were aggressive supporters of Mr. Bell, and so it naturally became the general opinion that Mr. Fife's chances of receiving the nomination were small.

The club is regarded by well-posted men as likely to be a most important factor in the approaching municipal election. It has a working membership of over 800 and well organized.

Mr. Evans' friends are possessed of considerable political sagacity, and while they made no stir about it, they got in and rustled enough votes to safely elect their candidate for another six months' tenure of his office.

When the night of the election came around Mr. Bell's name had his name neatly placed at the head of a printed ticket, which also contained the names of some of Mr. Fife's friends for election on the same ticket.

ONLY A TRACE OF GOLD.

Result of the Second Examination of School Section 10, Tacoma.

Olympia, Jan. 12.—Special.—A hearing was had Friday in the local land office regarding the report made by Geologist Paulhamus and the results of the examination of section 10 in Tacoma, which J. G. McBride has attempted to secure by locating the same as a mineral claim, and since that time has been making a vigorous canvass in Mr. Bell's interest, as the latter was of considerable assistance to the sheriff in getting the claim located.

The examination was made by means of three tunnels, drifting from 10 to 15 feet back into the existing tunnel.
