RULES AND GRANTS

The President Wants Statute of Limitations Removed.

A MESSAGE SENT TO CONGRESS.

House Passes Pensions Appropriation Bill, Carrying \$141,000,000.

This Is a Larger Sum Than Was Expended Last Year—Bill Passed Fifty Days Earlier Than Ever Before—The House Chaplain Prays for Cuba.

Washington City, Jan. 17.—The president today sent to congress the following message:

To the Congress: I desire to invite attention to the necessity for prompt legislation in order to remove the limitation of time within which suits may be brought by the government to annul unlawful or unauthorized grants of public lands.

The demands made by the public, and in some cases have resulted in the reinvestment of title to the lands in the United States upon demand, but in most cases the demand has been made and suits have been necessary. The work of adjustment has been unavoidably slow.

It is necessary, in making such an adjustment, that all questions of certifying claims, either on the part of the railroad or between roads the grants for which conflict or overlap, be finally disposed of, so that a proper disposition of the land can be shown.

Wood, Rep. Ill., offered an amendment providing that pensions should be paid quarterly to those on the rolls at the new rate, and that the rate of such increased rates as hereafter may be allowed.

The Rival Hawaiian Cable Scheme. Washington City, Jan. 17.—Edward L. Bayless, of New York, one of the projectors of the Pacific Cable Co., which recently failed, has been in the city today.

The Proposed Investigation of Bowler. Washington City, Jan. 17.—Some talk concerning the resolution introduced by Bowler of Louisiana for investigation of the control of the sugar industry by the house committee on interstate and foreign commerce, which he did at the meeting of the Hawaiian cable committee, was given today.

The Pension Appropriation Bill Passed. Washington City, Jan. 17.—The house today passed the pension appropriation bill, to the consideration of which it had devoted the entire day.

NEW MAN HAS AN EXCEEDINGLY DIFFICULT JOB IN FRONT OF HIM.

Antonio Maceo Is Burning Towns in Pinar del Rio, Maximo Gomez Is Near Havana, and Jose Maceo, With the New Army, Is Rushing East, Sweeping Everything Before Him.

Havana, Jan. 17.—Capt. Gen. Martinez Campos formally resigned his command today to Gen. Marin. The ceremony took place in the great salon of the captain general's palace.

When I came to Havana from Matanzas I sought to avoid a public appearance, but I had not requested, because an enemy of public demonstrations.

He Did the Best He Could. The captain general, looking over the situation with a friend this evening, is reported to have said: "I have done the best I could under the circumstances, and my only regret is that I have labored under such difficulties."

Anxiety in the City. The anxiety felt over the situation today, the public business, and many commercial houses closed their doors long before the usual hour.

Move Bibles Burned in Peru. Lima, Peru, Jan. 17.—The mayor of San Miguel seized and caused to be burned in the public square of the city all the Bibles and stock of the local agent of the American Bible Society.

The Japanese Government Sustained. Washington City, Jan. 17.—A telegram was received by the Japanese legation today, stating that on the 9th inst. a vote was taken in the diet upon a motion to present a memorial to the emperor attacking the foreign policy of the government.

Free Silver in Michigan. Lansing, Mich., Jan. 17.—An executive committee of nine, representing the points of view of the free silver conference, who will carry on the work of organization and education.

He Was Guilty of Horrible Cruelty in the Ten Years' War.

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DIG WAS IN GERMANY.

Quarter Centennial of Foundation of German Empire.

BISMARCK UNABLE TO ATTEND.

On Jan. 18, 1871, Emperor William I. Was Crowned at Versailles.

Amnesty to Be Granted to Offenders, but the Socialists to Be Pursued Again, for Their Organ Obtained and Printed the Emperor's Order in Advance of Publication.

London, Jan. 17.—A Berlin dispatch to the Standard says: "All the German sovereigns will grant a limited pardon to criminals on the occasion of the celebration of the anniversary of the proclamation of the empire."

The war minister has ordered an inquiry into the breach of secrecy by the Vorwarts in publishing the emperor's decree.

Today Emperor William will celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of the crowning of his grandfather as emperor of Germany in the palace at Versailles.

The coronation of the emperor in 1871 was also the proclamation of the formation of the German empire, the realization of Bismarck's dream for the unification of the Fatherland.

The ceremonies began by the imperial dignity of united Germany being consecrated with a Lutheran religious service.

On the right stood State Minister Delbruck, Count von Moltke and many other statesmen.

Frank Lawler Died. Chicago, Jan. 17.—Frank Lawler died this afternoon of heart failure.
