CUBA'S NEW GOVERNOR. Gen. Martin's Reports to Madrid Are

GAOMEZ HURDLES A MAJOR

And Rests His Weariness in the Bed of a Marquis.

HE BREAKS THROUGH THE LINES

Several Bloody Engagements, With Losses on Both Sides.

No Change in the Government's Policy Yet Announced, but Political Reforms Are Promised—Gomez Continues to Harass the Troops by Sudden Attack and Sudden Retreat—He Destroys a Train by Dynamite.

Havana, Jan. 19.—There is to be no change in the policy of the government in Cuba, it is announced, as the result of the changes in the executive. Also it is asserted that political reforms will be inaugurated as soon as the program of the war will allow. No further specifications are given as to what the contemplated reforms are, or how far they will extend. From Madrid it is reported that Gen. Gomez has been appointed to be appointed centurion in place of Gen. Arderius.

Further reports have now been received of the engagement between Col. Galbis and the insurgents near Batabano. It is said the insurgent forces which attacked him were those of Gomez. The troops met the attacks of the insurgents on their knees, and with their fire until they were within a short distance. The report says the insurgents left eleven killed on the field and nine were found in a cane field a short distance away. The insurgents retreated, it is said, with a numerous loss, while the loss of the troops was insignificant.

Although the report thus stated that Gomez was repulsed and defeated, it is reported that he moved afterwards south to Melena, upon Guama and in the direction of the village of San Nicolas. These points are about a few miles from Batabano, and would indicate that Gomez was successful in his attempt to break through the line.

During his operations yesterday Gomez invaded Baro and Pueblo Nuevo, which are within the limits of Pinar del Rio. The garrison made a heroic defense, the colonel taking part in the battle, and upon being charged with the bayonets, the garrison was repulsed to have retreated with a numerous loss. The troops lost nine men. Gomez is now proceeding in the direction of Cienega, the great swamp in the southern part of Matanzas, for the purpose, it is supposed, of awaiting the junction there of the forces which are advancing from the eastern provinces.

A large force of insurgents, consisting of the bands of Rabi and Jose Maceo, passed the village of Manzanillo today. The insurgents burned the railroad station at Casaca, and the next morning they moved on to the village of San Nicolas. The major of the village of San Nicolas has been hanged by the insurgents. The town of San Juan de los Rios, in the district of Sagua, the insurgents lost eight killed and five taken prisoners. The troops lost one killed and one taken prisoner. The station at Santa Cayetano, in Havana province, has been burned.

A report comes today from Santa Clara that the insurgent band of Alberto and Pacho Rojas, which is part of the force from the eastern provinces, which Gomez ordered to the relief of the insurgents in the west, has made an unsuccessful attempt to break through the military line of La Trinchera. The insurgents, it is reported, attacked the Spanish forces on the railroad running from Cienfuegos and Sagua La Grande, which approximately marks the La Trinchera military line. The insurgents have also attacked a fort on the plantation of Constanza in the Cienfuegos district, and it is said were repulsed with a loss of six killed and six wounded. It is also reported that Col. Galbo has fought the forces of the insurgents which have been in Pinar del Rio, at Pacho Rojas, north of Batabano and on the railroad between that point and Havana. The new military line which has been established to keep the insurgents in the Vuelta Abajo district follows this railroad, and it is explained that the insurgents were endeavoring, though unsuccessfully, to break through the line.

Maximo Gomez was reported as moving from Alquiza last night, and as having slept in the bed of the Marquis Davalos on the plantation of San Antonio.

London, Jan. 19.—A dispatch to the Times from Madrid says Gen. Weyler, the new governor of Cuba, will abandon the old policy toward the insurgents and adopt a complete change of tactics.

Madrid, Jan. 19.—Although Martinez Campos has declined the appointment of president of the supreme military court of justice, his appointment will nevertheless be gazetted. Gen. Martin has been appointed governor of Porto Rico.

GEN. CAMPOS' RESENTMENT. Says He Has Not Resigned, but Has Been Removed From the Command.

New York, Jan. 19.—A dispatch to the World from Havana says: Gen. Martinez Campos, after surrendering the supreme command in Cuba to Gen. Martin, made the following indignant statement to the World. The censor forbids its transmission by cable, and I send it by messenger to Key West.

"I speak because I am now a private citizen, and not the governor general. Be it known that I have not resigned; the government has removed me, and has done so with a great resentment, caused by the conduct of the parties in Cuba. Nations exercise the right of sovereignty in various ways, but the best should always be the principle of authority should rise superior to all else.

"I have been opposed because, while I may be a private citizen, I have prevented a repetition of the said scenes of the last war, and this has been distasteful to the mob.

"The question is this: Here is a province, distant from the mother country, where the political parties by the attitude they are taking, think to shape the policy of Spain. If they do this, the idea, I could specify show what the necessities of the situation are. But they know what they would find in the way if they should ask me to assume the command of the province in the last war, and because of this knowledge they conspire behind my back.

SOUTHERN STATES ARMING

In a Belief that Spain Will Sell Cuba to England.

St. Louis, Jan. 19.—A special to the Republic from Tallahassee, Fla., says: Sensational rumors are afloat here tonight. Gov. Mitchell, at the request of the war department in Washington City, has ordered Adjt. Gen. Houston to see that the Florida military be placed in readiness to take the field at a moment's notice. The governor, it is reported, will call the militia tomorrow. In the meantime the adjutant general is quietly issuing orders. Similar reports, it is reported, have been sent to the governors of other Southern states. The story has become generally known and is causing excitement throughout the South. Mitchell and Gen. Houston were asked in regard to it, but they refused to talk. Gen. Houston has been in his office all day and sent telegrams to all station commanders in the state. Maj. Turner, of Jacksonville, commanding the First Florida battalion, has received several messages from Adjt. Gen. Houston. The battalion headquarters at Tampa and Pensacola have also received messages from Gen. Houston during the day.

It is stated as coming from the executive office that the Washington City authorities have reason to believe that a deal is pending between Spain and England for the sale of Cuba to the latter, and that the United States is preparing to resist the transfer of the island, and that the United States is coming to American waters ready for the war with the United States and will inevitably follow the attempted cessation of Cuba.

Dispatches from various cities in Florida report that the troops are gathering and that the war fever is spreading. At the day after President Cleveland's Venezuela message.

Fleeing to Florida. Havana, Jan. 19.—The band of Bermudez plundered Sierra Linares in Pinar del Rio, and it is alleged the negroes of the band violated all the women they could find in the last five years.

Tampa, Fla., Jan. 19.—The steamer Oliveette tonight brought forty-five refugees from Cuba and last night landed 120 in Key West. Three hundred refugees are already booked for the next trip and additional benches and cots will be taken to accommodate them. Those who arrive today say that if one does not participate in the revolution they must leave Cuba or join the Spanish forces. Those able to leave are doing so, and the rest will join the revolution and greatly swell the Cuban army. Gen. Campos is expected by the next steamer to return to Spain through the states and New York.

Warm Sympathy From Editors. Tampa, Fla., Jan. 19.—The National Editorial Association, on their eleventh annual excursion, reached here this morning, 20 strong. The editors express warm sympathy for the insurgents' cause and stated that at the convention to be held in St. Augustine this week resolutions would be adopted urging their recognition.

Raised the Cuban Flag. Galveston, Tex., Jan. 19.—At a secret meeting here today of the Cuban Club the flag of the insurgents, called the Cuban flag, was raised over the headquarters of the club.

CARTOONIST GILLAM DEAD. His Political Caricatures a Principal Feature of Judge.

New York, Jan. 19.—Bernard Gillam, the noted cartoonist of Judge, died yesterday morning at the home of his father-in-law, ex-Senator James Arkell, of Canajoharie.

Bernard Gillam was an Englishman by birth. When he was a young man his family came over and settled in Brooklyn, where Gillam went to the public schools. When he left the public schools he announced himself as a penny artist and in due time exhibited a picture in a Brooklyn gallery. All Brooklyn went to see this marvel, and all Brooklyn laughed. Even Gillam's friends poked fun at him. He went into a lawyer's office as clerk, but before the end of the year he turned to art again and as a portrait painter had a facile success.

He then sat clearly that caricature and the cartoon was his gift and he tried to force an entrance into the weekly papers. His first work was for Frank Leslie's Weekly. He was now made a member of the staff of Harper's Weekly. From Harper's he went to Park and there drew the cartoons that gave him his national reputation. The first of these, "The Tattooed Man," will be remembered by all who remember the Blaine campaign of 1882. He left Park to join I. J. Well in the firm of Gillam and I. J. Well. He became a partner in the firm, the name being Arkell & Gillam.

An Anti-Socialist Judge Dead. Berlin, Jan. 19.—Judge Branswert, who was the severest and most reactionary of the Berlin judges in all political trials, is dead. As was mentioned in the Associated Press dispatch yesterday, he had recently become insane and had been placed in an asylum. An attempt is now being made to have some of his severest sentences set aside.

THE EMPEROR'S YOUTH.

Said to Be the Chief Characteristic of His Reign.

THE TIMES'S MANY REVIEWS.

England to Pay Back the Kaiser for His Interference.

The British Flying Squadron to Sail Wednesday With Sealed Orders—Another Crisis in Bulgaria Feared—Russia's Foreign Policy—France and England to Delimit Their Boundary.

London, Jan. 19.—The Berlin correspondent of the Times in the course of a long special article recalling the splendid enthusiasm of the victory of 1871, writes: "Can it be said the heart of the German nation responded yesterday with the same enthusiasm, the same confidence in the splendid memories of the past were not to some extent dimmed and marred by disappointed expectations and uneasy apprehensions? The German nation is not in a mood to receive a sovereign of a strangely different type, of whom all that can be said is that in this year of his age, and the length of his reign, his chief characteristic is his youth."

The correspondent then proceeds to refer to the absence of Prince Bismarck, the king of Saxony, the Grand Duke of Baden and Gen. Blumenthal from the celebration, reviewing the internal troubles and menacing outlook abroad, he says: "The Germans can look forward without apprehension to the coming of a new emperor upon which it is universally felt the destinies of this young empire still hang. Between the lines of the leading articles of the past few days, the German nation is disappointed weariness and uneasy restlessness which have cast over the glorious memories of the past the shadows of the future. Responding to an invitation issued by the greater German empire across the sea, though formulated at Saturday's banquet for the first time in such impressive terms, the emperor's presence is probably the Kaiser's mind for a long time, and probably furnishes the key to Germany's recent activity in China and the annexation of Alsace-Lorraine."

Yesterday's ceremony was invested with every element of a spectacular pomp, but in the moderate papers, complaints are made that it partook more of the character of a state pageant than a national festival. The Cologne Zeitung and the National Zeitung are bitterly sarcastic over the exclusion of the press. The Times has a dispatch from Vienna which says: "On the whole, the German festival elicited no remarkable outburst of enthusiasm in Austria. The Emperor's arrival in Vienna on Monday, Jan. 19.—A Berlin dispatch to the Times says the new William order has been bestowed upon the Countess von Wallburg, the Baroness von Stamm and Dr. Stapfer."

REAR ADMIRAL BELKNAP BELIEVES THE FLYING SQUADRON IS COMING HERE.

New York, Jan. 20.—A special to the World from Boston says: "If the British flying squadron should come over to the United States, Rear Admiral Belknap, retired, at his home on Beacon street, 'I wrote to Adm. H. H. Hunt at Hampton Roads three days ago, that it would surprise me if the British flying squadron should be first to land from LaGuayra. From the moment it was announced that the squadron was to be sent to the United States, I made up my mind it would be the American waters that would not remain unvisited because matters had quieted down in the Transvaal and the excitement over Emperor William's telegram to Kruger had subsided."

He reported activity at St. Lucia and the British dock yard at Esquimaux, at the mouth of the St. Lawrence, and in the Pacific, emphatically confirm such a conclusion.

While some of our people are arguing that the emperor's visit will inaugurate the Monroe doctrine and apologize for anything England does, of whatever character, in any part of the globe, the British government is, in the meantime, indirectly preparing to take what she claims as belonging to her in Venezuela. I am of my opinion, if that flying squadron should appear in American waters and under such conditions, an emperor would be regarded as a menace to the United States."

London, Jan. 19.—The flying squadron has now been completed and is lying off the coast of the Straits. It is expected that it will be gotten up to enable the admiral to put the squadron in motion. On Monday, according to the programme, the fleet will then move down to Cows Bay, to be inspected by the queen and by the emperor. The fleet will then move on to go aloft for this ceremony but will however be the maneuvers from Coterne Bay. The squadron will sail on Wednesday for a long cruise as no foreign boats have been commissioned to accompany it. Rear Admiral Drake, in the command, will only get his final orders for the cruise at the last moment.
