FREE COINAGE SUBSTITUTE.

The House to Reach a Vote on It About Tuesday.

Washington City, Feb. 9.—The first business of importance before the Senate on Monday will probably be the vote on Senator Gray's resolution for the recommitment of the revenue tariff bill to the committee in finance.

The Henshaw resolution in regard to the distribution of seed by the agricultural department will by agreement be taken up early in the week.

There will be an effort to secure an adjournment from Thursday until Monday to permit the Pacific railroads committee to continue its hearings.

The interest in the Quay resolution is enhanced by the knowledge that the vote will be very close.

Under act 69 of the constitution, the legislature will meet on the 19th inst.

RHOODES' GREAT SCHEME.

To Create a British Johannesburg in Rhodesia.

IT RESTS ON ONE CONDITION. Whether Gold Can Be Found in Its Vast Plateaus.

London, Feb. 10.—The Times has an article this morning on the plans of Cecil Rhodes in South Africa, of which it says: "The first chapter in the scheme is the creation, under a British administration, of a British Johannesburg in Rhodesia."

Amesbury, Mass., Feb. 9.—The schooner Florida, from Belfast, Me., was wrecked at 10 o'clock tonight and her crew of seven men perished.

NO MORE BODIES FOUND. Bristol, Conn., Feb. 9.—Three thousand people visited the scene of Thursday night's disaster, when the Pequabuck bridge gave way, today, and hundreds searched the river for missing bodies.

Heavy Gales in New York. New York, Feb. 9.—The French liner La Gasconne, from Havre, arrived off quarantine about 10 o'clock last night, dropping anchor well over toward the Long Island Sound.

Rolling Down an Embankment. Cleveland, O., Feb. 9.—The derailing of a truck on the Cleveland, Canton & Southern mixed train near Delroy, O., late yesterday afternoon, threw a passenger coach down an embankment. The car caught fire.

CHICKASAW TRUST FUNDS. Delegates to Be Sent to the Capital to Draw a Portion of It.

Arkmore, I. T., Feb. 9.—The Chickasaw legislature, now in session at Tahimingo, has appointed C. A. Burris, Holmes Culbert and ex-Gov. William Guy, delegates to Washington City to protect the Chickasaw interest before congress, and to draw from the United States treasury \$100,000 of the funds held in trust by the United States government, with which to liquidate the nation's indebtedness.

Cuba's Success Assured. Key West, Fla., Feb. 9.—Three-masted schooner which passed here today signalled the pilot boat Nonpareil, and informed the captain that he was from Cuba, and that he had on board two thousand men.

Proposed Venezuelan Compromise. London, Feb. 10.—The Chronicle believes there is a good prospect of a settlement of the Venezuelan question by a compromise between the three governments concerned without loss of dignity.

The Zetons Surrender. Constantinople, Feb. 9.—The porte has communicated to the embassies of the powers its reply to the proposals of the Zetons of their conditions of surrender. It is stated that the porte promises a satisfactory settlement.

Asks for More Troops. Rome, Feb. 9.—It is stated that Gen. Baracca has asked for the immediate dispatch of twelve battalions of infantry, six mounted batteries and 2,500 miles to Erythraea.
