MANY NEW CANNERIES

Puget Sound Salmon Packing to Be Quadrupled.

WEST SEATTLE GETS A SHARE.

The Enormous Profits of Last Year - Heavy Investments From Portland and Victoria.

The most active line of business on Puget sound during the winter months will undoubtedly be that of canning salmon. The number of canneries will be more than quadrupled, while there will be few canneries left in the city of Seattle.

Canery for West Seattle. W. Eastham, of Portland, a man of considerable means, was here two weeks ago quietly looking over the field. He made his business known to a number of persons with whom he must come directly in contact in negotiating for sites and gathering the information possible about the local character of the business.

Victoria Man Profits the Sound. J. F. Stokes, a wealthy merchant of Astoria, has been in the city for some time for the purpose of securing a site for a cannery.

Another wealthy merchant, shipper and dealer in salmon, is Mr. J. H. Todd, of Victoria. He will locate at Anacortes. Mr. Todd has frequently been in the city of Seattle.

Another capital largely interested. The third cannery for Anacortes is that of F. L. Lord, formerly of the Fraser river, which much has already been published.

British syndicate in the field. The Richardson cannery will be built by a British Columbia syndicate with ample means. It will also get fish from about the same grounds as the others of Filadelfia and the San Juan Islands.

Other two new canneries for Seattle have not been fully organized as yet, but the conviction is that the construction can be partially understood when it is known that the Port Angeles cannery shipped the bulk of its fish from the Seattle cannery.

Last year's salmon pack on Puget sound was the largest ever known. Every one engaged in the business in any form has made money. The extent of the business is exactly favorable, with good weather and the right amount of water in the streams, or perhaps the lack of it.

No new canneries for Oregon. There is no prospect of any more salmon canneries being built on the Columbia this season, so canneries claim. According to their stories there is nothing in the cannery business; but there will be a considerable increase in the amount of gear put into the water.

These new plants for Alaska. In Alaska the prospect for new canneries is nearly equal to that of Puget sound. The W. H. W. Co., of Seattle, which is largely owned by J. N. Knowles, of San Francisco, is understood to be engaged in the construction of at least two big canneries at Hatter bay and the other at a point within the Sound.

Send to Wales for Their Coke. It has occasioned some surprise that the Hattam smelter should send to Wales for the coke for use at the smelter at Nelson.

A group of mines that will be adding very materially to Alaska's yearly output in gold is the Fanner Bay group. Since the purchase of this group, which occurred about October 1st, and work commenced about November 1st, work has been going on rapidly.

There is more activity in the mines in the Kettle Falls district. In the past three years, work has been progressing for four weeks on the Silver Queen, a night and a day shift of men being employed.

The Spokane Review says that in no other district has so much been done and so little being said as in the Coeur d'Alene. This section, if the estimates of reliable sources are correct, will produce about \$7,000,000 this year, and this without any great effort.

THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF SEATTLE.

ARTICLE I. General Rights and Liabilities.

Section 1. The municipal corporation now existing and known as the City of Seattle, shall continue to exist as a body politic and corporate in name and in fact, by the name of the City of Seattle, and by that name shall have corporate powers, may sue and defend in all courts and places, and may acquire, hold, convey, mortgage and dispose of the same for the purposes of the city.

Section 2. The City of Seattle shall continue to have, hold and enjoy all public buildings, lands, wharves, water, property, roads and persons, franchises, and other public places, rights of property, franchises, taxes, licenses, fees, revenues, records, archives, claims, delinquent taxes and assessments, and all other rights and liabilities, and shall be subject to all obligations, debts, liabilities and claims of the existing municipality.

Section 3. All contracts of every description heretofore made by the City of Seattle, entered into by the City of Seattle, by virtue of which the City of Seattle is bound to the extent only that they are now valid and binding upon the City of Seattle, shall remain in full force and effect, and shall not be affected by the provisions of this charter.

Section 4. The adoption of this charter shall not affect any special or local assessment, or assessment or proceeding now pending or remaining uncompleted, which shall be held to the provisions of the provisions of this charter relating thereto, and the provisions of this charter shall be construed as continuations of such former provisions and not as new provisions.
