SIXTY MINERS SLAIN.

Terrible Explosion in a Coal Mine at Newcastle, Col.

APPEAL TO FRANCE.

The Radical Leaders Accept the Senate's Challenge.

A GENERAL ELECTION LIKELY.

The Socialists to Stamp the Country—An Appeal to the Revolutionary Spirit to Be Made.

London, Feb. 18.—The correspondent of the Times at Paris says: "The cabinet council today made further arrangements as though no crisis existed."

A Paris dispatch to the Daily News says: "M. Bourgeois makes no secret of his opinion that the time has arrived to brave the senate and to appeal to public opinion against it. He will not resign if the majority remains constant."

"One of the immediate effects of the crisis is a movement for banquets throughout the country in honor of the anniversary of February 24, 1888, the year universal suffrage was proclaimed."

Paris, Feb. 18.—The political crisis is not solved. The friends of the government say that the moderate senators desire a settlement of the disputes, and, according to the Rappel, the Radical deputies will not raise a debate on the subject when the chamber meets on Thursday, but it is added, the moderates will do so, and the extreme left intend to stomp the country in protest against the attitude of the senate.

London, Feb. 18.—The Paris correspondent of the Pall Mall Gazette telegraphs that the political situation in France is growing more serious. "Those best informed," the correspondent writes, "consider that the cabinet has a card up its sleeve which will cause considerable surprise. It is certain the ministry means to stop where it is, and there is a possibility of a coup d'etat."

Paris, Feb. 18.—M. Bourgeois, the premier, has informed the members of the left that the government does not desire to again raise the question of confidence in the chamber of deputies on Thursday, preferring to wait for further action of the senate.

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SEXTON LEAVES PARLIAMENT. John Dillon Elected in Justin McCarthy's Place.

London, Feb. 18.—Thomas Sexton, anti-Freudian, has resigned his seat in parliament. The members of the Irish parliamentary party today elected Dillon the new chairman to succeed Justin McCarthy by a vote of 27 to 21.

RUSSIA'S GRIP ON KOREA. The New Minister's Puppets in the Pay.

London, Feb. 18.—A special dispatch from Shanghai this evening says that information has been received there from Korea that a Russian force supported the king of Korea in killing the Korean cabinet. The new cabinet of Korea, it is added, are wholly puppets in the pay of Russia, and it is not doubted in certain circles that the whole coup was directed from St. Petersburg.

The Troubles of Korea. San Francisco, Feb. 18.—The steamer Peiking, from Yokohama, arrived this morning. Another rebellion has broken out in Korea. The governor of the Tanuung district has been taken prisoner by the rebels. The Korean troops defeated the rebels in two engagements, but the rebels are not yet subdued.
