Spain Attacked as a Wicked and Cruel Nation, a Violator of the Laws of Civilization—Not a Voice Raised for Spain but That of Caffery, Representing the Louisiana Sugar Planters—The House Will Take Up Cuba on Monday—The Resolutions Are for Recognition of Belligerency and for Interference Against Spain.

Washington City, Feb. 28.—By the overwhelming vote of 64 to 16, the senate today adopted a concurrent resolution favorable to Cuban belligerency and independence.

THE OATMEAL MORTGAGE TRIAL Letters From Grattan H. Wheeler, the Tacoma Bank Wrecker.

Operations of His Mutual Investment Company—Suicide of John T. Lewis at Tacoma—The Trial of County Treasurer Hedges to End Today.

South Bend, Feb. 28.—Special.—The steamer Point Loma, Capt. Conway, was ashore this morning about 3 o'clock, at Long Beach.

Astoria, Or., Feb. 28.—The steam schooner Point Loma went ashore at 3 o'clock this morning on Long Beach, and was high and dry on the beach, a total wreck.

SUICIDE AT TACOMA.

James T. Lewis, a Nephew of Byron Barlow, Shoots Himself. Tacoma, Feb. 28.—Special.—James T. Lewis, a bookkeeper in the temporary employ of the Tacoma Trading and Transportation Company, shot himself at the foot of 28th street, committed suicide about 2 o'clock this afternoon by shooting himself through the head with a 44-caliber revolver.

The remains were first found by M. McKenzie, of 254 Carr street, who called at the residence of Lewis' mother, and in went to the warehouse in the rear. There he found the dead man partially reclining upon a pile of wood, with the revolver still in his right hand and a belt doing police duty for the most wicked nation on the face of the earth.

The trial of Hedges this morning made a vigorous assault on the evidence furnished by the prosecution, and Attorney W. H. Snell, of counsel for the defense, addressed the court, and in most emphatic language attacked the evidence offered. He outlined a hypothetical case with the court himself as the accused party.

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CUBA SHALL BE FREE.

The American Spirit Aroused Against the Spaniards.

WAR WOULD BE POPULAR. Congress Realizes that the People Are Realists in Earnest.

The Temper of Congress Strongly in Favor of Intervention—The Horrible Butcheries of Weyler and the Heroic Deeds of Gomez and Maceo Have Stirred the Blood of the Great Republic.

Chicago, Feb. 28.—The Post's Washington special says: Beyond question the United States people are more than ever in earnest in favor of intervention for the independence of Cuba.

New York, Jan. 18, 1895. "Dear Allen: The United States investor man came up to see me about six times, and finally I could not put him off any longer, so I had to meet it. He showed me a check for \$100,000, and I put in receipt of the \$30 check destroy it and put in its place the enclosed check on New York, which will pay it at Tacoma, should I not, then be able to meet it. He said another check. Don't want to draw on you for a dollar if I can possibly help it."

On the side of the sheet is this: "Don't put \$80 on our account in Tacoma. Destroy and use enclosed check to take it up with Truly. WHEELER." I was dated February 15, 1895. I have one here that my bank puts up collateral for our deposit. You must see that such is done. I think it is a good idea to make slip charge on the account which checks are charged to, and make the check up. So when the crash comes they will not be there. It is possible, if we can get underway, to save the thing bank. I will save something to keep this thing going, as it is our salvation, and will make all three of us rich. I will tell you what I think we should do—something to save Tacoma.

New York, March 4, 1895. "Dear Allen: Your 23d inst. bore me for 3—sake keep the machine going for 30 months anyway. By that time, if not before, we will be out of the woods. I find for credit \$50. While I am using more money than allowed, will kite a few checks. Keep the checks charged to me, while we will be all right. Yours, WHEELER." From another of later date: "Yours of the 8th before me. Eighty cents will give up until late state is broken—that will give us time to get the Mutual under way."

We want a president, and he must be an Eastern man. For G—sake keep going until we are on our feet here. Will be there just as soon as it is possible. I will fight that check once more—and in the meantime take it up with two small checks. The Mutual Investment Company, of which Wheeler's letters are full, was one of George Boggs' most brilliant ventures. It was widely advertised throughout the East and middle West, and the company was held as a sure winner for the investment of money by people of small means. The shareholders paid in small installments, and when fully paid in the shares drew 6 per cent. Boggs was originally given up until late state is broken—that will give us time to get the Mutual under way."
