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

Request President to Interpose Friendly Offices and Recognize Belligerency.

Following are the Cuban resolutions adopted by the senate:

Resolved, By the senate, the house of representatives concurring, that, in the opinion of the senate, the Cuban resolutions adopted by the senate:

Resolved, That the president is hereby requested to interpose his friendly offices with the Spanish government for the recognition of the independence of Cuba.

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FARM NOTES.

The amount of milk used in New York City averages about 75,000 quarts per day. The nearer the ground tomatoes are permitted to ripen, the sweeter and more palatable they are, but there is more danger of rot.

The tomato is the most difficult of fruits or vegetables to raise so far as perfecting to do. The potato does not do well in soggy soil. It would pay many of the low prairie farmers to drain their land for the benefit to the potato alone.

Staphylin is a rank poison to a sheep in cold weather. It opens the pores of the skin, and makes the sheep exceedingly susceptible to cold.

A sheep having a dry, husky cough will be improved by giving two teaspoonfuls of turpentine every morning for a week, an hour before feeding.

The popularity of the Jersey is likely to grow rather than diminish in Western Washington. It is a good dairy cow.

Northwest fruit growers who wish to try something new in the strawberry line will do well to grow the new variety known as the 'Berry of Home Origin' and very promising.

There are few males in the whole of the animal race more cruel or more brutal than the bull. He will follow a cow or a horse until both are worn out.

'Duck' Simmons, of Kamlichie, in Mason county, says he picked four tons of grapes from 150 trees last fall. The trees were four years old and most of them at 10 cents per pound dried.

Young hens may be killed a fortnight after ceasing to lay, and if they have laid a few eggs, they will be found to be a good deal better for the table as compared with fowls that are two or three years old.

When a cow is sick, clean the wound from all foreign matter and wash with tepid milk and water. Remove the scum from the wound with a clean cloth.

German experiments prove that it takes one pound of butter to produce one pound of milk. The butterfat in the milk is not so high as in the butter.

In England and Scotland the farmers raise large sheep, whose fleeces average over 50 pounds each. The fleeces are of various colors, but the most common is white.
