An Open Venire Issued in the Crockett Murder Trial.

THE DEFENSE FIGHTING HARD.

Commissioners Restore School Districts to Old Bonds-County Officers' Payroll.

Notwithstanding the municipal election the superior courts will be in session as usual, and the trial of Hugh B. Crockett for murder in the first degree, in having shot and killed a young woman, will begin on Monday.

When the case was called yesterday, there was the usual preliminary skirmish between the opposing counsel, resulting in a court order that the trial proceed.

The defense moved for a continuance on the ground that some of the subpoenas for the jury venire were not served.

The court granted the motion, and the case was set for Monday.

The proceedings were devoid of incident, the witnesses were exchanged from the courtroom, and through the hallway.

Some of them passing the time agreeably by tossing pennies. There was quite a large number of spectators in the courtroom, and considerable interest was manifested in the skirmishing of the attorneys.

The court set aside the venire, and the case was set for Monday.

The eleven jurors passed for cause are: A. A. Osborne, R. W. Lankford, W. B. Thomas, G. D. McDonald, C. E. Valentine, O. Hartung, C. M. Crawford and Albert Joyce.

The state's case is being conducted by Prosecuting Attorney Hastie and Deputy William H. Morris. Crockett has retained Brady & Jay, T. Ronald and M. G. Winslow.

A GOOD SHOWING.

Receiver Colvin Makes a Report on the First Avenue Cable.

Receiver O. D. Colvin yesterday filed his report as receiver of the Front Street Cable Railway Company for the six months ending December 31, 1935, with the following comparative showing and statement of assets and liabilities:

Assets: Road and equipment, \$306,655.68; Accounts receivable, 1,545.88; Insurance not accrued, 6,434.71; Supplies in store, 1,029.84; Cash in hand, 2,737.29; Profit and loss, 67,238.79.

Liabilities: Bonded debt, \$300,000.00; Capital stock, \$600,000.00; Receiver's certificates, 2,826.73; Judgment, 6,756.94; Interest due National Park bank, 46,189.00; Interest on judgment, 1,832.94; Court costs, 13.70; July 31st payable, 13,648.09.

The report makes a favorable comparison with last year, showing a good outlook for the road. The track and roadbed are reported in good condition, except at the foot of University street, where repairs have not been made.

A GERRYMANDER KNOCKED OUT. Commissioners Re-Establish Boundaries of Two School Districts.

By a ruling of the county commissioners yesterday school districts 42 and 57 are restored to the old limits, and a change in the boundaries of districts 41 and 43 by Superintendent Laybue is set aside.

The districts are in the neighborhood of the Blackhawk Indian reservation, and the change, which was made by the superintendent in response to a petition, consisted in the transferring of about fifteen acres from district 42 into district 43.

When the taxpayers of district 42 found out what had been done, they at once took steps to secure a reversal of the order, and a petition to the commissioners was signed by R. E. Axt, M. E. Leachman, J. L. Rostgaard, W. S. Storr, F. J. Rimsa, C. P. Nason and I. C. Klein.

Mr. Axt was the petitioner in the case. Mr. Axt showed that if the superintendent's decision were allowed to stand, district 42 would have two children left in section 2, two in section 35, three in section 28, none in sections 31 and 36.

As the district draws from the treasurer \$5 per child of school age, the sum available from that source would be only \$42 a year, and as the law requires three months' school under penalty of forfeiture of the apportionment, Mr. Axt contended that the decision would work a positive hardship.

Section 43 is part of the Muckleshoot Indian reservation, and before the decision was made district 42 drew \$60 apportionment for that portion of Indian children, thus enabling the school to be conducted the required three months.

Inasmuch as the district is unable to support a school six months in the year, it was set aside.
