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Dr. Edmund W. Fall, who is known from one end of the city to the other, and even to the other end of the world, was not at his office in the Rowell block, corner of First avenue and Columbia street, yesterday afternoon.

When his creditors, to say nothing of his patients, called to see him, they discovered that the office looked awfully dreary. In the language of the other tenants of the building, "the doctor had skipped."

Wednesday night Dr. Fall set out on a sale for what property he had in his office to P. Q. Robbins, the attorney. As near as could be learned the sum named was \$50. Then he packed up his office and disappeared. Despite the fact that his name did not appear upon the passenger list of the steamship Walla Walla, there is a strong belief that he went for the means of leaving the city. It is supposed that he will stay in San Francisco long enough to deal his interest in a Nebraska farm to his sister. This is the farm that was given to Mrs. Fall in Judge Humes' court at the time she obtained a divorce from the doctor.

No list of the doctor's creditors could be obtained last evening, but it was stated on good authority that he owed good sized bills at L. Chopart's, on Second avenue, the clothing store on Queen street, and the two women nurses who took care of him at the time he made his "run play" in the Rowell block two or three months ago; W. W. Gay, janitor of the building, a small bill, and many others.
