WON SCHROEDER DEAD.

The Prussian Master of Ceremonie's Wound Fatal.

WHAT WILL THE EMPEROR DO?

It Is Understood He Abetted Count von Kotze in His Denial.

The Anonymous Letters Accused Even the Emperor of Immorality, and the Scandal Involves His Sister and No End of Princes and Noblemen - Von Kotze to Be Prosecuted.

Potsdam, Prussia, April 11.-Baron von Schroeder, master of ceremonies at the Prussian court, died today, his death being the result of injuries inflicted by Count von Kotze, formerly one of the court chamberlains, during a duel fought yesterday in the vicinity of the new palace at the residence of Baron von Schroeder, who was wounded in the abdomen at the time of the meeting on the field of honor, and his recovery from the injuries was considered from the first doubtful, if not impossible.

The death of Von Schroeder will undoubtedly go a long way toward reviving the great court anonymous letters scandal, which for years has furnished material for the gossip of Europe, with a series of startling sensations. The arrest of Von Kotze for participating in this drama with Baron von Schroeder has already been ordered, and he has announced his willingness to surrender to the authorities.

It is also stated that the Kaiser will be seized upon by the Liberals as an opportunity for making an interpolation in the Reichstag, the claim being made that the authorities knew that the Kaiser was about to take place, and made no effort to interfere. If the matter is to be given an airing in parliament, as well as in the courts, the names of persons high in society and political life in Germany, in fact, of royalty itself, cannot be kept out of the case.

The story of the arrest of Count von Kotze, of his imprisonment on the charge of writing letters over the signature of "Wien" to the Kaiser, and of the arrest of the emperor of immorality, the content of the loss of the diary of Princess Charlotte of Saxe-Meininingen, the eldest sister of the emperor, and the flight from Berlin of Dr. Friedman, the counsel for Von Kotze during his eventful trial, have all been told by correspondents of the Associated Press.

After an anxious and protracted trial, the anonymous letters were still received by royal persons, and this, taken in connection with other circumstances, led to the release from prison of Count von Kotze, and his restoration, apparently, to royal favor. It has been repeatedly intimated that Emperor William was secretly indulging in sending out whole-sale challenges to the accusers of Von Kotze.

The tribunal recently threw out of court suit for slander which Von Kotze brought against Baron von Schroeder. This suit was followed immediately after the first trial between Baron von Schroeder and Von Kotze, in which both of the combatants received flesh wounds. The officers of the two regiments of cavalry with which Baron von Schroeder and Count von Kotze are connected, after having constituted themselves into courts of honor and duly investigated the charges of slander which Von Kotze brought against Baron von Schroeder, decided that Von Schroeder was entitled to an acquittal. More than this, they declared that Von Schroeder was justified in his remarks, and they appealed to the emperor to dismiss Von Kotze from the army. This verdict of the court of honor was followed by Prince Frederick of Hohenzollern, the commander-in-chief of the garrison of Berlin. Emperor William, however, decided to let the matter rest, and Prince Frederick accordingly resigned his command, removing to Bavaria and stating that he could not associate with Von Kotze. Other members of the nobility followed the lead of Prince Frederick, and for a time there was a general exodus of princes from Berlin. Naturally, interest will be centered in the punishment meted out to Count von Kotze because of his duel with Baron von Schroeder and because of the death of the master of ceremonies of the Prussian court.

BERLIN CABLE LETTER.

Another Cure for Consumption - Discontent in the Army.

Berlin, April 11.-Intense interest has been aroused in medical and other circles here by the announcement that a young physician, Eric Langheld, at the international physicians' congress at Wiesbaden today, that he had discovered a new remedy for tuberculosis of the lungs, which is his principal ingredient, it appears, are ozone and cod liver oil, applied by subcutaneous injection. In the experiments conducted the past five years, he explained, the greatest difficulty to overcome was that of keeping the ozone pure and easily available. Of the ninety cases of tuberculosis he treated in the Moabitte hospital during the past year, all have been cured. Prof. Gerhardt and Senator fully confirmed the foregoing statement.

From a high official of the foreign office the correspondent of the Associated Press learns that Emperor William, who arrived at Venice today, is greatly pleased with his Italian trip. The Prussian government has sent to the diet an appropriation bill calling for the building of Prussian auxiliary railroads at a cost of \$6,500,000 marks, and another bill calling for 3,000,000 marks with French to create a credit agency as a relief measure for husbandry.

Some sensation has been caused by an anonymous author, said to be a well-known officer of the general staff, who has published in the Hanoverian Courier a sharp attack directed against the emperor in a protest against pensioning army officers on mass. The author, it is said, there are as many officers in retirement as in activity; that too many tried and experienced officers are sent to the army, and that no vacation in the whole empire today is as insecure as that of the officers, from captain upward, which has created a bitter dissent in the army.

The big Bismarck monument at Rastenburg, Thuringia, erected by the German statesmen, will be unveiled on May 2.

Prince Bismarck, in conversation a few days ago, said: "I have always thought regarding our colonies, that we ought alike to secure the coasts first, by plantations, as the Dutch have done in Java, leaving the interior undisturbed, but we have too many little colonies and Prussia must wish to see laurels." Officially, negotiations on the subject take place between the United States charge d'affaires, Mr. Riddle, and the Turkish minister for foreign affairs, but the minister is still understood and seems to be assuming a graver aspect as time passes.

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WAR SUPPLIES FOR CUBA.

Three Expeditions Beside the Fernan-ces Have Recently Been Landed.

Key West, Fla., April 11.-News was received here last night of the landing on Cuban soil of the expedition commanded by Col. Monson Aguiar, who had forty-five men, 40,000 cartridges and a large amount of dynamite. Although the expedition cost but \$50,000, it is considered as important as that of Garcia and Collazo, because no money was spent on a steamer from R.
