The Anti-Saloon Party Makes Its Nominations.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE INDORSED.

The Convention Held Here Yesterday, Made Up of Eighty Delegates, Starts the Campaign.

The state convention of the Prohibition party in Washington was held in Banker's ball room at Fifth and Pike streets yesterday afternoon, and a full state ticket was put in the field headed by R. E. Dunlap, of Seattle, for governor.

The resolutions. Following the main feature of the platform, which declared for absolute prohibition of the liquor traffic, these resolutions were adopted.

Resolved, That the right of suffrage ought not to be abridged on account of sex.

Resolved, That the free expression of the popular will is essential in a representative government, therefore we favor the adoption of the initiative and referendum.

The obnoxious features of the convention was the general drag in the transaction of business. There were not more than 30 present, and when nominations were called for no one seemed prepared to launch a candidate on the floor.

To account for the slim attendance it was stated that many of the delegates had been unable to find the hall, and were undoubtedly wandering about the streets with their chairs in the air looking for signs of a temperance gathering.

The proceedings. The convention was called to order shortly after 2 o'clock by Rev. Clark Davis, of Seattle, who presided over the delegates from the different counties.

The election of the temporary chairman was then proceeded with, and on nomination of George Cotterill, of King county, King county was elected by unanimous vote.

The following committee was elected, consisting of one committee man from each county represented.
