

PROTECTION OF THE ISSUE

Mark Hanna Does Not Put Silver in First Place.

M'KINLEY'S MANY VISITORS.

The ex-Governor Drives to the Train to Meet His Manager.

H. Clay Evans Says the Tariff is the Paramount Issue for Tennessee—Ellis, the Oregon Silverite, Sees His Error—Gov. Lord Declares Against Free Silver.

Canton, O., June 22.—Five hundred citizens of Muskingum county came to Canton on a special train tonight, including delegations from Zanesville and Dresden.

Congressman H. C. Van Voorhis was with the party, and Mr. McKimley, the governor, mounted a chair, and when the cyclonic din that came from a thousand cheering voices had subsided, addressed his visitors briefly.

National Republican Chairman M. A. Hanna, Col. Fred Grant and wife, H. Clay Evans, Tennessee Silverite Everett, of Cleveland, spoken of as possible treasury of the national committee, and Col. Myron T. Herrick, after lunch and a few hours with Gov. and Mrs. McKimley, left for Cleveland tonight.

Col. William H. Osborne, of Boston, remains a delegate. H. Clay Evans said the tariff was the paramount issue for Tennessee.

Before taking the train Mr. Hanna said no committee officers had yet been appointed. Protection he considered the best way to save the tariff.

Mr. Hanna declared that for three years he had considered Gov. McKimley the winning candidate and Mrs. Grant was enthusiastically for him.

ELLIS RETURNS TO HIS PARTY. The Oregon Congressman Leaves the Silverites.

Portland, June 22.—Congressman W. R. Ellis, who was re-elected at the late election, arrived from Washington City today.

Mr. Ellis has always been with the free silver men in the house, but he now signifies his intention of standing on the St. Louis platform. When asked today what he thought of the St. Louis platform, he said:

"In the main I like it very well. I will stand on it, but I am a Republican and always have been one. The money plank declares in favor of an international agreement, but against a ratio of 16 to 1. The agreement might result in the adoption of a ratio of 15 to 1, or some other fixed figure; but until such agreement is consummated I will stand on the St. Louis platform. I will support the tariff convention and work for the success of the Republican party."

When asked if he would support a free silver bill in the next congress he replied: "That depends on circumstances. It will be guided by the declaration of my party. It is the duty of the majority of the party to settle all questions on lines on which it can substantially agree, and I think some legislation on this subject will be adopted that will prove satisfactory to the majority of the party."

THE ATROCITIES IN CUBA. Weyler's Cruel Officers Continue to Brutalize Americans.

Havana, June 22.—Miguel Alonzo Cabrera and Andres Hernandez Rodriguez were shot to death by Spanish soldiers.

New York, June 22.—The American three-masted schooner Mabel Hooper, of Rockland, Me., which has just arrived in Havana, has been seized by Spanish troops.

While at the port the American consul told the captain of the Hooper in substance this story:

"I am satisfied with your explanation," said the Spanish commander of the Mabel Hooper. "You may return to your plantation."

"The Spaniard then sent for a young lieutenant and instructed him to take a party of soldiers to the plantation where Mr. Gonzalez was met by his wife and their children. The lieutenant said to the consul: 'You may enter your house,' said the lieutenant, 'and you will remain there until I send for you.'"

"The lieutenant and the soldiers piled a lot of dry grass and shavings about the house and set fire to it. The smoke soon compelled the family to leave, and as they fled the lieutenant ordered his men to shoot down the building being in flames, all were shot down. The lieutenant reported to his superior officer that he had been shot because they disobeyed orders by leaving the house. Gen. Gomez arrived near Sagua and ordered the soldiers to kill the Spaniards had killed Mr. Gonzalez and his family he became furious."

Gen. Wilson was a graduate of West Point. He had been in Cuba since December last, with 300 rifles, 50,000 rounds of ammunition, a supply of dynamite, etc. The expedition was in Cuba for the purpose of assisting the Cuban revolutionists.
