Abbott B. Clark to Lecture Tonight Before the Local Society. Abbott B. Clark, of Los Angeles, one of the Pacific coast lecturers on theosophy, arrived in the city yesterday from New York.

When interviewed last night, Mr. Clark had much to say about the convention of theosophists in New York, held after the death of W. Q. Judge, and about the crusade. E. T. Hargrove was elected to fill the vacancy left by Judge, and Mrs. K. A. Tingley is the "occult heir and successor of Mrs. Blavatsky and W. Q. Judge."

phases," he said. "There are the diastoles, the adepts and the Mahatmas, or great souls. The latter are the greatest. An adept and a medium occupy the two opposite poles of psychic development. In both the soul is somewhat free from the bonds of matter, but the medium is under the influence of outside forces, of which she has no knowledge and cannot control. The adept has developed the God-like creative powers latent in all men. He knows the laws of nature and controls them unobscuredly for the good of others."

"The adepts have planned the crusade for the purpose of teaching brotherhood on a scientific basis. The brotherhood of man is a natural law, the violation of which, like any other law, brings suffering. It is time for theosophy to come down from the cloud lands of scientific and philosophical speculation and bring truth, light and liberation to the minds and lives of millions."

He read an extract from the speech delivered by Mrs. Tingley at the recent meeting of the "Crusaders" in Boston. The address was an eloquent one, and said the key to the crusade was the recognition of the soul as the basis of every action and social condition.

Mr. Clark will lecture before the Seattle Theosophical Society tonight at their headquarters, 613 Third avenue, on "Mahatmas, Who and What They Are," and "The Future of America."

After visiting all the countries of Europe and holding conventions and mass meetings everywhere and doing special work for the poor, the crusaders will go to Egypt, where a secret brotherhood is said to preserve the lost arts of that country. They will then proceed to India, Australia, China, Japan, and return by way of San Francisco, visiting Seattle and other large cities. While on the Pacific coast they will dedicate the site for the "school for the revival of the lost mysteries of antiquity." This school will ultimately cost over \$500,000 and will be for the study and demonstration of the science of the soul.

Active operations have already been begun, and the sum of \$32,000 was raised by volunteer subscriptions in twenty-four hours at the convention. Tuition will be absolutely free, and all will be admitted whose practical knowledge of theosophy and inner development entitle them to receive the divine mysteries.

MISS POTVIN'S CONCERT.
